CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

At a special meeting of the city council last evening the mayor and all members were present. After coming to order Alderman Lafore offered the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the order made by the common council at its regular meeting held Oct. 17, 1933, instructing the city recorder to issue warrants to the marshal for the collection of the assessment for the improvement of Commercial, Ferry, State, Court and Center streets be and the same is hereby rescinded."

Alderman Albert suggested that the collection of the street assessments could not be revoked, as the order had been made pursuant to statute, and not at the will of the council, and believed that it would compromise the city's interests.

Mayor Gateh took the position that the resolution was all right, and that it was in the city's interest, and believed that it should pass.

Alderman Cross said as members of the council it was their duty to transact the business of the city as they would their own. They should have compelled the Chemskeka street delinquents to pay up a year ago. They have the kind of an improvement they asked for, and should pay for it, as they have already defrauded the city out of \$1300 interest.

The following vote was had on the resolution: ayes, Lafore, Gray, Klein, Noes, Albert, Hunt, Smith, Cross, Olmsted.

The following motion was made by Alderman Hunt, which was adopted: "That the recorder be instructed to withhold the warrants ordered issued by the council Oct. 17th for the collection of street assessments, until further instruction from the council."

On vote it required the mayor's voice to pass the motion.

Ex-Lieut. Gov. J. H. Fletcher is about to leave his Brown county farm to take up his residence in Salem, Oregon. Mr. Fletcher is one of our pioneers, a gentleman who is an honor and a credit to any community.

He was twice elected to the territorial legislature from this district, and was again honored by the voters of the state of South Dakota by electing him their first lieutenant governor. As a presiding officer over the state senate he distinguished himself by his marked ability and thorough knowledge of parliamentary tactics. In all his official capacities he has shown himself to be on the side of the weak and the poor, and his record while in the halls of the legislature is as pure and clean as man could possibly make it.
