Richard McGee Found Dead in a Saloon.

HIS FATAL THANKSGIVING CAROUSE.

Leaves a Destitute Wife and Six Small Children.

DEAD FROM DRINK.

Richard McGee, a laboring man, was found dead at the rear of Bill Anderson's saloon this morning. His body is lying at Clough's undertaking rooms. He leaves a wife and six children in destitute circumstances. His death was undoubtedly caused by excessive drinking of egg-nog at the aforesaid saloon, where it was served free to all who came.

THE BODY FOUND.
