Income Tax.

A New York paper announces the result of a poll of 171 members of congress relative to the taxing of incomes. The result is:

Favorable to such a tax 71. Opposed to it 62. Non-committal 68.

The answers serve to show very clearly that the question has a geographical phase. Those representatives who come from the East are opposed to the income tax by a large majority; those from the South favor it by an even larger majority; while those from the West are more evenly divided, with the majority for the income tax.
