### HORTICULTURAL NOTES.

From the Rural Northwest: Dr. J. Guy Lewis, after looking up the matter thoroughly found Oregon captured 75 medals at the Columbian Exposition. Of these 17 were in the horticultural department and 23 in the agricultural departments.

The varieties of peaches sent for exhibition and competition from the Peachblow Paradise Orchard, were Early Crawford, Canadian Cling, and Salway, covering a range of not less than three months in the period of ripening. The Crawfords began going to market in August and the Salways were not all off the trees on Nov. 5tb., the date of the last ship ment.

The proposed change in the tariff on prunes will reduce the price of pranes by about a ceut and a half a pound. The output of prones on the Pacific coast next year is likely to reach 70,000;-000 pounds. The loss resulting from this bill will be about \$1,000,000 which will mean a depreciation of at least \$10,000,000 in the value of the prune orchards of the Pacific states.
