

His Annual Report to Congress.

THINKS THE WORST IS OVER.

Wants Authority to Issue \$200,-000,000 Bonds

TO BE SOLD IN SMALL AMOUNTS

At all the Sub-Treasuries and Postoffices.

Carlisle's Report.

Washington, Dec. 20 .- The annual report of the secretary of the treasury, Car isle, was sent to congress today. It shows, during the first five months of the present fiscal year, the expenditures of the government exceed receipts, \$29,918,095. The secretary assumes the worst effect of the recent financial dis turbances and business depression, is past, that the remainder of the year will show better results. And he estimates the deficiency at the close of the year at \$28,000,000. To meet this, he recommends amendment of specie payments resumption act of 1875, to authorize him to se'l 3 per cent. bonds not exceeding \$200,000,000 in amount, at not less than par, saying however, that in his opinion, only great, pressing financial emergencies would justify resorting to an issue of bonds.

He suggests bonds be issued in denominations \$25 and multiples thereof, o be sold through sub-treasuries and postoffices. SILVER LEGISLATION. He says the repeal of the silver purchase act makes such a radical change in the currency policy of our government that until its effect is more fully developed he does not consider it advisable to recommend further specific legislation on that subject. He says a great increase in the bank reserve is the monetary centers of our country shows conclusively that the amount of money in the country is greater than required for the transaction of business. He finds one of the principal difficulties of the treasury to result from indisposition of the public to retain silver dollars and silver cartificates in circulation, and has sought to remedy it by increasing the number of silver certifiestes of denominations less than ten dollars, retiring the larger ones and substituting for them large notes of other kinds of cu rency.

The report then deals at length with tariff laws. He argues in favor of ad valorem duti s. He also urges strongly the sir bility of free raw materials, recommend a increase of ten cents per gallon on distilled spirits and additional taxes on c gars and cigaretts, and new taxes on playing cards, cosmetics, perfumeries, legacies, successions, incomes from stocks and bonds of corporations and joint stock companies.
