AFTER DR. PARKHURST.

Anarchists Want to Make Him Jump.

DARING OMAHA GRAVE ROBBERY.

Two Corpses Intended for the Iowa Medical School.

After Dr. Parkhurst. NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—Mayor Gilroy received a note in French today warning him not to allow anyone to go into the church or court where Dr. Parkhurst is. By so doing he would prevent great disaster because there are those who wish "to make him jump into the air," because he disgraced and dirtied New York and did so much harm to unfortunate women.

Grave Robbing. OMAHA, Neb., Dec. 30.—Two corpses were found in a box last night, at the Pacific Express office. They have been identified as those of Mrs. C. A. D. Brown, the wife of a well known Omaha man, buried in Forest Lawn cemetery Thursday, and M. W. A. McWhimney, an old soldier, who died at the county house, and was buried Tuesday. The graves were robbed by unknown parties. It is believed they were intended for the medical college, connected with the Iowa State University.

Unjust Judges in Trouble. NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—Justice of the Peace Newton and Sutherland of Gravesend, with "Boss" McKane, were arrested this afternoon. There are 11 indictments against McKane and two against each of the others. McKane was released on bonds.

Mrs. Lease's Successor. TOPEKA, Dec. 30.—Governor Lewelling appointed J. W. Freboro, sheriff of McPherson county, member of the board of trustees of state charitable institutions, to succeed Mrs. Lease.

Prendergast Dies. CHICAGO, Dec. 30.—Prendergast, the murderer of Carter H. Harrison will be hanged for his crime.

In the court-room he showed that one trait existed in common between he and Gunteau. He proved himself an unmanly, miserable coward, who would save his own life at any price. When Clerk Fitzgerald arose to read the finding of the jury the prisoner stood clutching the back of his chair his face flushed and his knees trembling violently.

"We, the jury, find the defendant, Patrick Eugene Prendergast, guilty of murder in the manner and form as charged in the indictment, and fix the penalty at death," read Fitzgerald.

Then Prendergast revealed himself to be an utter coward, his face turned pale. He opened his mouth to speak, but only a faint murmur came. He moved slightly, and would have fallen but for the assistance of the bailiff. When the jury was polled he listened with avidity to each and every answer to Judge Brentano's questions, and as each juror in turn reiterated the verdict the last vestige of courage left Prendergast. He was half dead and half carried back to his cell, where, refusing to speak, he threw himself upon his bunk in an attempt to hide from his fellow-prisoners, whose expressions of satisfaction over the verdict were more emphatic than graceful and more sincere than polite.

EXPECTS A NEW TRIAL. Assailed Prendergast is more cheerful this morning. After a good night's sleep he expresses himself confident of escaping the gas. He thought he would get a new trial easily with different result. Lawyer Wade says he has been receiving telegrams from lawyers in all parts of the country urging him to continue the fight for his client and that he could raise \$25,000 for defense from the bar alone.

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The Rebellion in Brazil.

BUENOS AYRES, Dec. 30.—The insurgent commander, Admiral de Gama, at Rio Janeiro, has given notice that he will shell the city in case the forces of the government do not withdraw their troops from his vessel. Representatives of foreign powers informed him he would give at least 48 hours notice before beginning the bombardment.

Probably True. LAHORE, India, Dec. 30.—Resolutions adopted by the national congress declare that fifty million people are on the verge of starvation and urged the government to take immediate steps to succor them.

Plenty of Money. NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—The city banks now hold eighty millions in excess of legal requirements.

Opinion at Washington. WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—The news from Brazil is looked for with some anxiety. Both at the state and navy department there is a feeling that a crisis is imminent, in insurrection, and that the quarrel will be settled in one way or the other within a few days.

Missing Stage Found. DENVER, Dec. 30.—The missing Lenders stage has been heard from. The passengers are safe. The stage is in five feet of snow. Passengers last night reached a ranch near by. The lost soldiers have ridden out on stage horses.

State Tax Board. This body of men continue their work of reductions. It has reduced revenue of the state over, from \$11,423,536 to \$9,939,996, or \$2,483,540.

County Commissioner Fawcett, of Tacoma, made 2000 p or children happy by giving them a big Christmas dinner.

A large mountain lion was caught in a steel trap, near Grand Road, recently. The animal nearly broke loose when discovered by the trappers.

At Pocatello, Idaho, an edict has gone out that henceforth no married woman or unmarried man will be employed in the public schools as teacher.

An investigation of the look of S. Murphy, ex-city treasurer of Baker City reveals a shortage of \$600 to \$4000. A warrant was immediately issued and Mr. Murphy placed under arrest.

An increase of \$142,645.43 in the net earnings for December, over the net earnings for the previous month, is reported by the receivers of the Northern Pacific.

Last Saturday, John King, of Moro, had both legs broken when he was riding his horse over a rock which injured him, falling under the wheel of his wagon.

Accident at the Indian School.

CHEWAWA, Dec. 30.—Wm. Miles, one of the engineer's boys was almost killed by being caught in the belt of the saw used for cutting wood. The right arm was broken badly and he was otherwise badly bruised.

Miss Libbie Jackson, of southern Oregon arrived on the overland this morning on a visit to her aunt, Mrs. S. G. Pugh.

Walter Morely, who bought part of A. F. McAtee's place, is putting out a large hop yard and orchard. He is talking of setting out an orchard of English walnuts.

BATTLE WITH INSURGENTS.

Convicts Revolt, Expecting to Fight the Government. ST. VINCENT, Dec. 30.—A delayed dispatch from Pernambuco, dated Dec. 22nd, says: There was serious fighting in Aguas Bellas on the 21st. Fifty soldiers were killed but the result of the battle is not given. A dispatch sent gives reports of a revolt on Convict island, Fernando De Noronha a number of guards were killed in the conflict.

Insurgent war vessels were expected there to help liberate all convicts to the number of one or two thousand, and take them to Rio to fight the government.

Davitt on Dr. Cronin. LONDON, Dec. 30.—In reply to a dispatch sent to Michael Davitt, December 24th, addressed to the Land League Cottage, the following letter was received today, dated Bally Braeh, county Dublin, December 27: I am obliged to Mr. Melville E. Stone, general manager of the Associated Press, for asking me to reply through the Associated Press to statements made in some of the Chicago papers, alleging that I advised the removal of Dr. Cronin. I can only answer that it would be just as true to charge me with having advised the removal of Julius Caesar or of Abraham Lincoln. I never even heard of Dr. Cronin's name or existence, until the spy, LeCaron, spoke of him at the Parnell commission hearings, and the news of the brutal murder came to Europe. The further allegations, that I wrote a letter to Detective Coughlin at that, or any other time is without a shadow of a foundation, as I neither knew, or of him, or wrote to him directly or indirectly; nor have I been written to by him or anybody in his behalf, in my life. The whole story is a monstrous fabrication from beginning to end and must emanate from some madman, or perhaps some interested knave who wishes to satisfy some feeling of malignity in coupling my name with the commission of so foul and cowardly a crime. I am reluctantly compelled to say, in connection with this infamous slander, that the press of America is the only press in the civilized world today through which such a brazen attempt at a libel, at the moral assassination of public men, can be made with impunity."
