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THE TARIFF CONTEST.

To have to arrest Democratic congressmen to make a quorum to enter upon a consideration of the tariff bill augurs ill for the prospect of its passage. In running away from the halls of legislation when the Wilson bill is up for debate shows that representatives have less fear of their constituents if they defeat that measure by non-attendance than if they keep the party pledges and pass the bill. But under whip and spur they are forced to attend and even put under arrest to carry out the Democratic program. The runaway congressmen are probably moved by a true instinct of self-preservation.

The Democratic party is at the most critical period of its history since the Charleston convention where it split on the slavery issue. Since years it has denounced protection as robbery and unconstitutional when applied to the tariff. Now it has control of all three branches of government and stands charged with the duty of carrying out its promised revenue tariff reform. It also stands charged with all the present idleness and want among the laboring people of our country. If it carries out its pledges and they prove no remedy for this distress, the Democratic party will be retired for twenty-five years to come. The present generations of voters will remember their sufferings and vote accordingly.

No wonder the Democratic representatives hesitate. No wonder they have to be brought back by the sergeant-at-arms. They understand the situation better than the leaders who are driving them on to defeat and the party to destruction along the free trade voyage. The Democratic leaders probably reason that free trade will win in our country as it did under Peel in Great Britain, and hold its place for half a century. But they reckon without their host. This country will never adopt British free trade.

Modern civilization demands four things: a good country; a great population; both of these we have; next the people must have something to do; then they become consumers. Under these conditions, the tariff system that will give employment is the system that will bring the greatest prosperity to a country so equally made up of producers and consumers. When laborers are employed at fair wages they become liberal consumers. The tariff problem is simply the problem of furnishing the most consumers. That solved, the producers and all who serve as middlemen do well. The country prospers.

Velocity of the Earth's Rotation.
Everybody knows that the earth makes one complete revolution on its axis once every 24 hours. But few, however, have any idea of the high rate of speed necessary to accomplish that feat. The highest velocity ever attained by a cannon ball has been estimated at 1,626 feet per second, which is equal to a mile in 3.2 seconds. The earth, in making one revolution in 24 hours, must turn with a velocity nearly equal to that of a cannon ball. In short, the rate of speed at the equator has been estimated at nearly 1,500 feet per second, or a mile every 3.6 seconds. Therefore it has been calculated that if a cannon ball were fired due west and could maintain its initial velocity independent of the earth, and could keep up the speed with which it left the mouth of the gun, it would beat the sun in his apparent journey around the earth.—St. Louis Republic.
