SUFFERING ON THE SANTIAM

Governor Penoyer Called on by a Settler.

HE CAN DO NOTHING TO HELP THEM

Recommends a Committee Be Appointed to Investigate.

One of the settlers on the Santiam, who has been in the city for some days trying to get work without success, today called on Governor Penoyer, and stated the case of the suffering up there, how the mills had shut down last summer, and the people were in want because the Oregon Pacific had not paid them anything.

The Governor went with the man to F. L. Hodgkin, Secretary of the Salem Board of Charities, who gave him a letter to W. L. Wade the president. The letter suggested that Mr. Wade go before County Judge Hubbard and ask that a committee be appointed to go up there, investigate and report to the county authorities.

DO NOT WANT COUNTY AID

The man who was before the governor is still in the city and says he does not think any number of the people up there, who are destitute, want county aid as paupers. They want to work for what they get and pay for it, and want their pay that is due them and think the state should help them get it. If they had half what is due them there could be no suffering on the Santiam. They do not want to come upon the county though some may have to be cared for in that way.

WHAT PENYOYER SAID.

Governor Penoyer said the distress of the people on the Santiam was a matter the county court would have to look after. He had given \$50 to the Sisters of Charity at Portland and \$50 to the Children's Aid society. He could do no more.

Following conversation took place between the man from the Santiam and Governor Penoyer:

Q. Can you do anything to help those people to get their pay?

A. I can do nothing. It is in the hands of the state courts.

Q. Is there any way that you can help those people to get work so that they can get supplies to keep from starving?

A. No. That is the business of the county.

Q. The people want to know if the state could do something to make the Oregon Pacific railroad company pay the people, and keep them from starving.

A. Immediate steps will have to be taken by some one to give them relief. I can do nothing. The matter rests with the court and the county.

The governor said THE JOURNAL had been seeking notoriety by attacking him, and that it was doing it to sell papers.

A DENIAL FROM MILL CITY.

A letter is published in the Albany Herald of Saturday refuting the statement of W. B. Holmes that there is no suffering on the Santiam. It is signed by 30 citizens and says:

As to the facts, at least one-third of our citizens are in destitute circumstances. Perhaps there are none actually starving, as yet. Some have a little flour left, some a little meat, and a few some vegetables raised in small gardens, but one-third at least are without the commonest necessities of life. While as yet no one has made complaint, the boys are dividing up with one another, and within 30 days nobody will have anything to dry, and then suffering will actually begin. Now this is the condition of affairs, and the possibility of a worse condition than this exists further up the river.

Following fling at the JOURNAL is hitched on, probably by some little Populist politician who wants to curry favor with the governor:

We would say to the CAPITAL JOURNAL, Penoyer may be a liar as that paper intimates, but it cannot make him a liar by lying, by garbling facts or by stifling dismal truths.

THE JOURNAL was the first to write a letter to Mill City to start the investigation that has led to all the action that followed. Mr. Holmes was represented to us as a reputable man and we believe he is. But his assertion does not agree with the above, which is not our fault. Penoyer's opinion of Cleveland or Cleveland's opinion of free silver, have nothing to do with the distress on the Santiam. That distress is due to the raciality practiced in the Oregon Pacific management. As soon as THE JOURNAL was sure of that fact it began to expose the rotten friendships and will continue its fight whether the state government or any one else joins with it or not. We invite Governor Penoyer and the rest of the state officials and all honest men to assist the laborers and settlers on the Santiam to get their just dues and then they will not be forced on the county for support.

A TERRIBLE ACCIDENT.

Expressman R. R. Ryan Has His Leg Cut Off.

R. R. Ryan, proprietor of the Willamette stables met with a terrible accident today as the 1:40 local train came in. He was knocked under the wheels and had his right leg cut off just above the ankle. He is a man about fifty years of age. His head and face were also considerably bruised, and he narrowly escaped with his life.

In a moment he was pulled out. The train had slowed up when it struck him and now stopped. Mr. Ryan was perfectly conscious. There was no physician at the depot and he sat up on the platform and with great nerve directed what should be done with his bleeding stump. Later Mr. Ryan became quite weak from loss of blood. A man who saw the whole thing says if the engineer had been looking out properly he could have saved Mr. Ryan from his terrible fate. He was talking to some one in the engine.

HOW IT HAPPENED.

As the 1:40 train pulled in at the passenger depot a truck loaded with baggage was standing at the north end of the platform. R. R. Ryan, who usually assists the baggage men with his truck and baggage, saw that the train would strike it, and made an effort to get it out of the way. Before he had it far enough to clear, the engine struck the truck, throwing the tongue of the same towards the engine, and thereby knocking Mr. Ryan down and foreleg him under the wheels.

Mr. Ryan was conveyed to his home shortly after 2 o'clock in a carriage, attended by Drs. Byrd and Smith. He was nearly unconscious and had suffered great agony from the shock to his nerves and loss of blood. He bore up very bravely through it all.

Mr. Ryan came from Kansas here a few years ago. He has been a hard worker, has quite a family dependent upon him, has recently built a large stable on South Commercial street and has by hard work built up quite a business.

His friends will be pained at this added blow of misfortune.

3. "Judge" McFadden, you say the bill of Fay & Gest, Hadley's attorneys, of \$48,000 is only against the bondholders, and not against the earnings of the road in any shape. It is not a fact that their bill was filed with Hon. J. S. Fulton, Fullerton's referee, before Hadley resigned?

4. "Judge" McFadden, is it not a fact that if the road sells for enough to pay the lawyer fees and court costs this outrageous claim will have to be paid, as well as any bill which you may put in? We expect you to answer these questions squarely.

FULLERTON'S GROSS NEGLIGENCE.

J. S. Marmon, of Detroit, Or., on Jan. 27th sends THE JOURNAL the following statement signed by many citizens on the North Santiam:

ED. JOURNAL: Please allow me space in your valuable paper for the publication of the gross negligence of Judge Fullerton. A few days before R. E. Mulcahy quit the O. P., he told a gentleman in this vicinity how he could get his money. He said Hadley did not qualify in the state of California, for him to transfer his account to a lawyer in San Francisco and attach the boat. He neglected to do so until after the sale, and before he could attach to his business the boat was at sea. I am credibly informed that Hadley caused the first attachment for bills he brought against the road and which he himself contracted. If this is not just cause for the removal of Judge Fullerton, to allow such a loop hole left open, so Hadley could get his work in. It is the opinion of all in this vicinity that the governor and state attorney should take immediate action in this matter, before the people would become disgusted from actual want.

MORE RESOLUTIONS.

Resolutions passed by the county executive convention of the People's party of Marion county, state of Oregon, at its regular meeting held in Grange hall Saturday, January 27:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this convention that the governor and state attorney should compel the receiver of the Oregon Pacific railroad to settle the claims due the employees at once and not to appropriate the earnings to pay extraordinary attorneys' claims, as has been done, and if he fails to do so, that the governor and state attorney take the matter in hand and operate it under state authority, and thereby protect the interest of the employees and the citizens of the state of Oregon.

Two men giving the names of Lee Hays and Wild Bill, were arrested by Constable McClaine, of Harrisburg on the charge of having broken into the residence of M. Garrison, near the Lion county line and having stolen \$140 from the same.

Deceased was born in Scotland. He leaves seven children, (his wife having died in 1886 in Minnesota); Ellen Gates, George Gibson, Iowa; Marian McDonald, Agnes Wilson, and William Gibson, Minnesota; J. R. and John Gibson who own the Robertson farm, seven miles south of Salem.

The funeral was held from the South Salem M. E. church at 2 p. m. today, Rev. J. M. Shute officiating.

A record has been kept from August 16, 1893, to the end of the year, of all the accidental shootings which have occurred in Oregon and Washington. The record shows that within the 19 weeks 24 accidents from guns have taken place. How many have proved fatal is not known, but 7 of the unfortunate died almost instantly after such mishaps. It is worthy of note that 15 out of the 24 so-called accidents were caused by intense excitement and great carelessness in handling guns.
