Cheap Postage.

Perhaps the greatest postal advance of recent times is that which England has just decided to adopt - penny postage for its vast empire. The British postal department, after much arguing, has finally accepted this proposition, which has been pressed for years by that indomitable reformer, Mr. Henneker Hoatson, and as soon as the necessary arrangements can be made the uniform imperial postage of a penny - 2 cents - will be established, and for that amount a letter can be carried from England not only to Canada and the West Indies, but to India, Australia and even the center of Africa. This is the cheapest postage ever proposed.

The United States has been making many improvements of late in postal matters, but it has never been able to catch up with England, whose lead in this matter we must acknowledge, and it is a striking tribute to the success of the English system that, superior as it is to ours, it yet nets a profit of \$15,000,000 a year to the government, whereas we usually have a deficit in our postoffice accounts. The truth seems to be that the better the postal service the greater the profit. The United States, under these circumstances, can well afford to make radical improvements, certain that it will be repaid for them in a short time.

It will strike every one at once that if England can maintain a penny postage for its vast empire, scattered as it is throughout the four quarters of the globe, it ought to be easily possible to secure a reduction in the rates now charged for foreign postage. - New Orleans Times Democrat.

A Dude and His Overcoat.

Early in the winter, when it appeared that there would be no cold weather, and he found himself in some what straightened circumstances, he pawned his overcoat. A Great Season For Maple Sugar.

"Unless I am greatly mistaken," said Loren Cushman yesterday, "the coming spring will be a great season for maple sugar making. It is well known to those who have engaged in this business that a good season always follows a winter that furnishes abundance of cold weather. The maple sap is always sweeter after a period of intense frost and furnishes a larger percentage of sugar. Not only that, but the trees yield a larger quantity of sap after a cold winter than they do after a winter that has frequent thaws and periods of warm weather. The snow in our country is very deep, and unless remarkably warm weather should come it will be on the ground until well along in April. There is such an immense body of it that sugar making will not commence until late in the season, but when we get at it we shall make more of the toothsome sweet than we have made before in years." - Norwick Sun.

Gravity and Impetus.

A proposition which provoked a great deal of argument and upon which much paper was wasted and the laws of gravity and impetus sadly mangled was the one about the result of dropping a leaden stone from the top of the mast of a rapidly moving vessel. The theorists got hold of the subject and straightway applied their best known rules and maxims to the problem. Some demonstrated that the weight would fall straight down, and while it was falling the ship would pass from under it and it would fall some where astern, or perhaps hit the man at the wheel. Others held that it would fall a few feet from the mast, and yet others that it would plump down right at the foot. This problem was solved in the usual way by one who was not a theorist, but who could climb a mast, which he did forthwith, and dropping the weight found that it took the impetus of the vessel and fell right at the foot of the mast, exactly as it would have done had the vessel been standing perfectly still. - St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

Examining the Brain by Electric Light.

A report comes to us from St. Louis to the effect that Mr. Donald H. Farquhar of that city has succeeded in so concentrating the electric light that it will illuminate the brain. The same plan can also be adopted when it is necessary to study the pathological condition in other parts of the body. A small cone of light from an 800 candle power lamp is made to penetrate the tissues, and it is said that broken bones can be studied and injuries learned that could not be revealed by the ordinary methods of examination. - American Theatist.
