Page 35 of comptrollers report in 1889 as to the bonded debt at various periods, says that on June 80, 1869, the bonded debt was \$2,166,568,920.

The bonds issued from Aug. 31, 1865. to June 30, 1869, were exchanged at par for legal tender, greenbacks and of course the bonds could not be used as money and the greenbacks were "retired" and burned, there was a contraction in less than four years of over one billion of dollars.
