**CONTESTING DELEGATIONS.**  
 Salem No. 1.—W. D. Jeffrey, John  
 Gray, P. H. D'Arcy, D. J. Fry, and  
 E. F. Osborn.  
 Turner—L. H. Small, Jr., J. N.  
 Baker, J. Wittchen, Ed. E. Pophan,  
 and F. M. Cook, Sr.  
 The convention met and was called  
 to order by County Chairman A. P.  
 Gordon at 11 o'clock today.  
 THE TEMPORARY ORGANIZATION.  
 County Chairman Gordon said they  
 were here to nominate a full county  
 ticket.  
 The opera house was well filled with  
 an earnest body of men.  
 Eugene Willis named Geo. E. Allen  
 for temporary chairman.  
 John Bane named Wm. Hendershot,  
 of Butteville. He withdrew in  
 favor of harmony.  
 Allen was nominated with great en-  
 thusiasm and took the platform. He  
 was congratulated by the chairman  
 and presented to the convention, a  
 contending and not acrimonious  
 gathering but as good Democrats to support  
 good government. Geo. spread the  
 eagle of Jeffersonian principles in good  
 style and won great applause. He  
 made a truly eloquent speech. He  
 asked that they bury all differences in  
 a common grave. If they were en-  
 gulfed in a wave of defeat, he appealed  
 to them to face it like men, waving  
 the flag of Democracy.  
 Wm. Kaiser moved a committee on  
 credentials. Carried.  
 Wm. Kaiser, J. M. Davis, Geo. Custer,  
 D. J. Holmes, Frank Dearborn,  
 were appointed.  
 Joseph Albert was made secretary.  
 John Bane asked a hearing on a mo-  
 tion at this point but was snowed under  
 with cries of "sit down."  
 Webster Holmes moved a committee

of five on order of business.  
 W. W. Elder, Webster Holmes,  
 Wm. Murphy, Louis McClaine and  
 Sol Durbin were appointed.  
 P. H. D'Arcy moved a committee of  
 five on apportionment. Thompson  
 said he hoped the gentleman would  
 not want five delegates from one pre-  
 cinct. Federal officials had no right  
 to sit down on Democrats, said D'Arcy.  
 Dave Holmes moved to amend to  
 select delegates out of the body of the  
 convention.  
 The viva voce amendment was  
 adopted. In the mean time there had  
 been a bloody round between D'Arcy  
 and Thompson.  
 E. H. Flagg moved a committee of  
 five on platform. Mr. Flagg, B. F.  
 Bonham, J. T. Morley, Sam Hayden,  
 Jas. Godfrey were appointed.  
 Eugene Willis and Jas. Coleman  
 were appointed tellers.  
 John Bane arose to make a motion.  
 The air grew terrific with rattling of  
 chairs and ten or twenty voices. Mr.  
 Bane's voice was lost in the din and  
 babel and a motion to adjourn to 11:45  
 swept him off his feet and hurled him  
 into the oblivion and tumult that pre-  
 vailed.  
 At 1:30 the committee on credentials  
 reported delegates nearly as printed  
 above. The J. D. Fry faction were not  
 allowed seats from Salem No. 1. A  
 dozen men jumped up and charged  
 that their lists of names had not been  
 reported correctly. The chairman  
 offered the suggestion that they come  
 upon the platform and adjust their  
 differences with the committee. Forty  
 men arose and soon the stage was a  
 seething mass of Democrats. That  
 fountain of peace and harmony called  
 the Democratic party of Marion county  
 overflowed once more.  
 The Thomas delegation in the county  
 convention was thrown out.

**AGAINST CLEVELAND.**  
 A resolution endorsing Cleveland  
 was tabled. D. J. Fry moved to re-  
 consider amid howls of rage. Billy  
 Miller said they did not want the post-  
 offices. At this critical juncture the  
 daring and fearless Tom Walt sprang  
 upon the platform and declared in  
 vociferous tones:  
 "I endorse that resolution. I do  
 want the postoffice."  
 Great cheers.

 As this report closed the convention  
 was nominating delegates to the state  
 convention. E. H. Flagg was chosen  
 delegate at large.
