**TEMPORARY ORGANIZATION.**

 Moores was elected. In a brief speech  
 he referred to the Democratic assem-

 vention fairly. H. S. Jordan was made  
 temporary secretary by acclamation.

E. S. Ormsby moved a committee of  
 five on credentials. Chair appointed:

 Tooze, J. S. Taylor, W. L. Simeral.

The report of the committee on cre-  
 dentials was submitted showing dele-  
 gates as here published. Nearly every  
 delegate was present, there being not  
 over half a dozen proxies.

It was moved and carried that all

 referred to committee without debate.

 but the majority report was adopted.

 at 7:30. Everybody invited to attend.

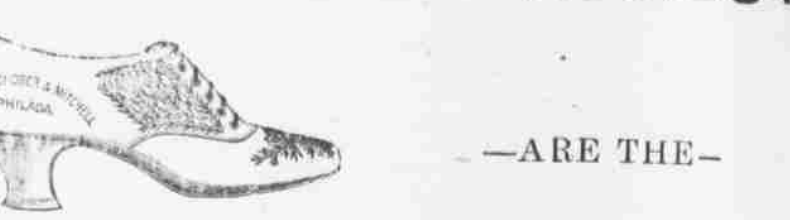
