### BLIZZARDS AND BOMBS.

Heavy Snow Storms Raging in the East.

### ANOTHER BOMB IN A CHURCH

Injures Many People and Kills Several.

KANSAS CITY, March 22.—At noon yesterday the thermometer registered 73, at 7 this morning 27. Ice formed half an inch thick.

HEAVY SNOW. MOORHEAD, Minn., March 22.—Two feet of snow have fallen since last night. A high wind is blowing. All trains are delayed.

OMAHA, Mar. 22.—The blizzard that has been raging over the northwest for forty-eight hours, continued today in western and central Nebraska, eastern Wyoming and the Black Hills. All trains on the Union Pacific between the North Platte and Cheyenne are tied up, but snow plows are out and a great effort will be made to clear the track and trains will leave for the West this evening. The snow has ceased falling west of Cheyenne, but a terrific gale is blowing. The Elkhorn road is snowed in up west of O'Neill and the Burlington and Wyoming lines is entirely blocked. The snow storm reached the Missouri today, but only in light flurries. The real storm had only advanced as far east as Columbus at noon. Snow varies in depth from one foot on level, at Sydney, to four feet at Spearfish. The effect on cattle will be disastrous, as all the big ranges of the state are in this district and are covered by deep snow.

### ANOTHER ANARCHISTS' BOMB.

Exploded in a Paris church Entrance.

PARIS, March 22.—A bomb was exploded yesterday afternoon in the church of Galien, near Grenobles, as the congregation was departing. The explosion was just inside the main entrance. There were twenty injured and three probably fatally. A panic ensued, during which a number were trampled under foot and injured. No arrests have been made.

### Bland Silver Bill.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 22.—It is stated on good authority that the president has not yet decided what he shall do with the seigniorage bill. He is said to be inclined toward a veto and to take the position that the purposes of the act are now covered by provisions in the existing law of (Sherman act) authorizing the coinage of bullion, the secretary of the treasury being empowered to coin seigniorage when earned.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 22.—The house by strict party vote seated the English Democratic contestant from the third California district.

### Will Veto Seigniorage.

CHICAGO, Ill., March 22.—A Washington special to the post says the president will veto the seigniorage bill.

### Hawaiian Excitement.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—Naval circles are excited over an order recalling Commander Kirkland enroute for Hawaii and instructing Admiral Walker to take command of our naval forces at that station. The orders are understood to be due to a well authenticated report that the Hawaiian government is about to apply to some other power for either annexation or protectorate and wish of the president to have an old and war tried naval officer in command at Hawaii, should such a thing come to pass.

### Washington Appointments.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 22.—The president appointed Jessie F. Murphy register of the land office at Olympia, Washington; Wm. H. Dunphy receiver of public moneys at Walla Walla, Washington; Edward A. Hawkins receiver of public moneys at Olympia, Washington.

### Pollard-Breckenridge Case.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 22.—The Pollard-Breckenridge trial was resumed this morning with reading of affidavits in behalf of defendant.

### Bimetallism in Iowa.

DES MOINES, Ia., March 22.—The Interstate Bimetallism league convention met. The forenoon was devoted to caucusing. Among the prominent delegates here are Governor Rickards, ex-Governor Hauser, Lee Mantle; J. B.

Tools of Montana; A. J. Warner of Ohio, and Captain Kolb, free silver candidate for governor of Alabama.

### Local Option.

DES MOINES, March 22.—The house by a vote of 53 to 45 passed the local option bill. This if passed in the senate will nullify all existing legislation on the liquor question and put Iowa in the list of high license states.

### Iowa Legislation.

DES MOINES, Iowa, March 22.—The house passed a bill granting school and municipal suffrage to women. The senate passed the liquor bill which was passed by the house yesterday.

### Prendergast Loses.

CHICAGO, Ill., March 22.—The United States court of appeals this afternoon denied Prendergast's petition for a writ of habeas corpus.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., March 21.—The attorneys for Prendergast will make an argument before Acting Governor Gill, this afternoon, for executive clemency on the grounds of insanity. It is not believed he will interfere with the courts of justice.

CHICAGO, March 21.—The state circuit court granted the application to have the question of Prendergast's sanity tried. The trial began this afternoon.

Judge Baker's action is said to mean a postponement of execution of the Prendergast verdict, and if the prisoner is found insane, the result will be an indefinite postponement.

### Another Boodler Goes.

NEW YORK, March 22.—Constable Jamison, of Gravesend was found guilty of perjury, in carrying out the program of John Y. McKane at the election, last November. Justice Newton plead guilty of complicity in election frauds and was sentenced to 10 months imprisonment and started at once for Sing Sing.

### Trust Funds Sustained.

CORVALLIS, March 22.—Special—Judge Fullerton has handed down his decision sustaining the plaintiff's demurrer to the separate defense of defendant in the case of Benton county vs. J. R. Bryson, assignee of Hamilton Job & Co. This is a suit to declare \$11,000 of Benton county's funds deposited in the bank, a trust fund and a first and paramount lien on the property in the hands of the assignee, and similar in its nature to the suit brought by the Agricultural college against the assignee for some \$18,000 deposited by its treasurer. The court in sustaining this demurrer in effect decides that the deposits were trust funds. A similar case is pending the decision of this, in Lincoln county, where Z. Job and Ben Job were indicted by the grand jury. The case will now go to supreme court, and if confirmed there, the indictment will be dismissed. When the three trust funds are paid in all probability nothing will be left for other creditors.

### Contract Let.

ASTORIA, March 22.—It is reported that the contract has been signed by Fitzpatrick and Collins, of Omaha, and R. W. Baxter, for the construction of the Astoria road.

NO DISCORDANT NOTES HEARD

Largest County Convention Ever Held in Oregon.

FULL TICKET CHOSEN AND NO FUSION

Most Harmonious and Formidable Political Body Ever at the Capital.

After the nominations of I. L. Patterson and W. H. Hobson were made unanimously for senators, following were placed in nomination for representative:

Messrs. E. Hofer, C. B. Moores, Wm. Armstrong, David Craig of Macleay, McKinley Mitchell of Gervais, J. Q. Wilson, H. L. Barclay, S. Farrar, J. M. Wagner, J. L. Calvert of Hubbard, C. F. Hicks, Warren Cranston, W. B. McAllister, John G. Wright, S. B. Ormsby.

The result was as follows, 123 ballots being necessary for a choice: Hofer, 119; Moores, 195; Armstrong, 82; Craig, 110; Mitchell, 61; Wilson, 42; Barclay, 92; Farrar, 32; Calvert, 120; Hicks, 60; Cranston, 73; McAllister, 33; Wright, 49; Ormsby, 68; Wagner, 33; and Pooman, 1. Mr. Moores was the only one elected at this time.

Messrs. Wilson, Hicks and Farrar withdrew their names prior to the second ballot being taken.

The second ballot resulted as follows: Hofer, 159; Armstrong, 67; Craig, 121; Mitchell, 56; Barclay, 182; Calvert, 206; Cranston, 54; McAllister, 18; Wright, 27; Ormsby, 41; Wagner, 18; Wilson, 1; Hicks, 1.

Messrs. Hofer, Barclay and Calvert were declared elected.

Messrs. Armstrong, Ormsby, Mitchell, McAllister and Wagner withdrew their names—the latter through Mr. Carson of Yew Park. A motion was made that the rules be suspended and David Craig be nominated by acclamation. After some brief discussion this was withdrawn and the third ballot taken.

The count of the third ballot was: Craig, 154; Cranston, 80; Wright, 1; blank, 2.

The nomination for county recorder was next: E. G. Keene of Salem No. 4; W. H. Cooper, of Stayton, A. F. Blackerby, of Silverton, Frank W. Waters of Salem, C. P. Strain of Woodburn, and J. C. Pilet of St. Paul were named to be voted for.

Upon a ballot being taken the totals were as follows: Keene, 27; Waters, 109; Cooper, 12; Blackerby, 77; Strain, 9; Pilet, 6; Wilson, 1; blank, 2. There being no choice—it requiring 123 to elect—the second ballot was then taken. Messrs. Keene, Strain and Cooper withdrew their names.

The result of the second count was the election of Mr. Waters by a vote of 132. Mr. Blackerby received 109.

A motion to adjourn was offered by A. J. Boney of Salem No. 3, but cries of "no," "no," "let's have another," went up from two-thirds of the delegates desiring to settle the clerkship before partaking of supper. This motion was voted down.

W. L. Tooze mounted a chair and in stentorian tones placed the name of W. W. Hall of Woodburn before the convention. E. E. McKinney was nominated by A. O. Condit, L. V. Ehlen of Butteville, R. D. Allen of Silverton, and John W. Roland of Jefferson were also named. Proceeding to ballot was next in or-

der and the result was as follows: Hall, 42; McKinney, 54; Ehlen, 60; Allen, 14; Roland, 62. Total number of votes cast 241. Neither having a majority a second ballot was required.

This gave the following result: Hall, 32; McKinney, 55; Ehlen, 92; and Roland, 62; 237 ballots were cast. Again no choice.

The name of Mr. Hall was withdrawn.

A third ballot was made necessary with the number of candidates for the nomination reduced to three—Ehlen, McKinney, and Roland. The ballots when counted gave the following result: Ehlen, 115; McKinney, 65; and Roland 72—244 ballots (the full delegation) were cast. There being no choice the fourth ballot was necessary. Loud cheering greeted the fact that Mr. Ehlen had made considerable gain this time.

Another motion to adjourn was made but it was voted down with a tremendous "no."

The fourth ballot was taken, and while the tellers were reading the ballots many of the delegates kept tally along with the clerks. The number of votes that each of the three contestants received this time was, namely, Ehlen, 117; McKinney, 41; Roland, 83; 241 votes were polled. No choice, but a gain of two for Ehlen and eleven for Roland with a loss to McKinney.

Some one moved adjournment until 8:30 o'clock and afterwards changed it to 8—he said he was hungry. The motion was voted down.

The fifth ballot was, Ehlen 139; Roland, 88; McKinney, 16. This elected Mr. Ehlen and the "north" delegates went wild. Mr. Roland mounted a chair and said:

"Gentlemen of the convention, up to a few moments ago I was a Roland man; from now on I am an Ehlen man."

Another tremendous yell went up, and some one proposed three cheers for John Roland and again the air was filled with yells and throwing of hats. Mr. McKinney followed suit with an assurance that he was another strong Ehlen man "from this time on." More cheering.

A motion was made to make the election of Mr. Ehlen unanimous and it passed by a full vote.

The candidate-elect came forward and extended his thanks to the delegates for the high honor. At about 7:45 o'clock an adjournment for one hour was taken.

EVENING SESSION.

The convention was called to order at 8:45.

J. Q. Wilson named John Knight for the nomination of sheriff. He was chosen by acclamation.

Ed. T. Judd named R. G. Brown for
