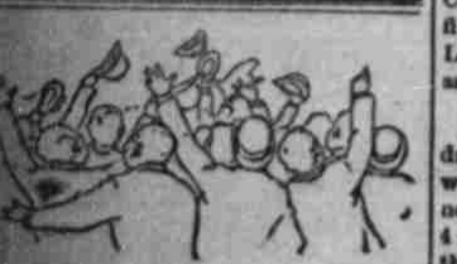
A BABY STEAMER—Geo. S. Skinner, of Independence, expects to have a new passenger boat on the river and ready for business by the first of July. The dimensions of the boat will be 61x33 feet and it will draw twenty-six inches of water at the stern and ten inches at bow and will be propelled by anti-horse power gasoline engine. The boat will carry thirty people. The intention is to ply between Independence and Salem, principally during the low water season.

Col. Tom Wait and the Salem Post-office.

There was more than a fairy tale in the personal item in Friday's JOURNAL to the effect that Col. Tom Wait, of Salem, had an inside position in the Salem postoffice fight. There is some political history connected with the matter of general interest.

In the legislature when Mitchell was elected Senator Col. Wait had a brother-in-law in the Oregon senate, and a brother-in-law S. D. Gibson, in the lower house. Wait met Mitchell at Portland and was instrumental in bringing Mitchell out.

"If you go into the fight!" said Col. Wait, "go there with blood in your eye, and do not care whose corns you trample upon." Mitchell did so and won. He was elected the day after Col. Wait returned from the East and meeting him at Portland, thanked him personally saying: "You are the first man who suggested to me the way to win in that fight, and I am under great obligations to you. If I can ever do you a favor I will do it."

The two men have been friends ever since. It is needless to say the two members of the legislature refused to vote for Mitchell "first, last and all the time." Col. Tom did not help fire the Penneyer cannon, but feels very sanguine about getting the Salem post-office.
