THE SALEM FRUIT CANNERY

Leased for the Berry Season to the Fruit Union.

WILL ALSO BE RUN NEXT FALL

Salem to Be the Great Fruit Market as Usual.

The Marion county fruit growers held a meeting yesterday afternoon and evening with good results. First they concluded arrangements for the operation of the big Salem cannery for the berry season. Second, they established prices for marketing small fruit. The cannery has been leased from the Wallace estate and the surplus strawberry, blackberry and black-cap raspberry crop will be canned up. No fruit will be marketed under the following prices by members of the union, as it is believed as much or more can be realized by canning: Gooseberries, 3 cents per pound or 15 per gallon; a rawberries, 5 cents per box; blackberries, 5 cents; black-cap raspberries, 6 cents. It was deemed necessary to enter into a compact to maintain these prices, in order to insure the union against loss in operating the cannery, and the members are bound to these prices only while that concern is in operation.

The management is in the hands of a careful business men whose interests are identified with the growers. Mr. Lyman, who was foreman of the cannery last season, has been engaged; he has an excellent reputation as a canner. Mr. Shepard, the manager and secretary, went to Portland today for the purpose of looking after cans and other supplies to be used in the operation of the cannery. Those who have fruit that they desire canned should call upon the manager at once in order that provision may be made for sufficient supplies. It is learned from Mr. J. M. Wallace that the cannery and evaporator will, without a doubt be operated in the fall to handle the pear, prune and apple crop.

Chadwick's office this morning and have called a meeting of the whole committee to meet at same place on Monday next at 2 p. m. TRUSTEE'S MEETING.

All day yesterday the board of trustees of Willamette university were in session, receiving the work and conditions of the past year and in the evening officers were elected.

The degree of D. D. was conferred upon Revs. M. C. Wire and John Parsons. The degree of Master of Arts was conferred upon Miss Ellen J. Chamberlain, preceptress of the Washington state university at Seattle.

Prof. Willis C. Hawley, for the past year acting president of the university, was elected president by a unanimous vote and accepted the honor in a feeling address. The following were elected as officers for the ensuing year: Gen. W. H. Odell, president; Hon. F. R. Smith, vice president; Rev. J. H. Roork, secretary; A. N. Bush, treasurer. Messrs. A. N. Bush, F. R. Smith and Dr. J. Reynolds were selected as trustees to supply the vacancies on the board caused by the expiration of their term of office. J. H. Albert, C. B. Moores and Leo Willis were chosen as an auditing committee for the ensuing year.

Rev. I. D. Driver was reelected lecturer upon theology for the ensuing year, and Rev. J. H. Roork was reelected as financial agent and the bishop presiding at the ensuing conference was requested to detail them for this work.

On motion of Rev. J. N. Denison a committee, with Gen. W. H. Odell as chairman, was appointed to submit to the coming legislature the propriety of granting to the medical department of Willamette university the same appropriation from the state treasury as is now being drawn therefrom by the medical department of the State university, and to secure such other legislation as may seem proper.
