FOUND DEAD WHERE HE SLEPT
An Irish Claim Locator Dies of Heart Disease.
 The body of a dead man was found in Yew Park today. He is identified as Joseph J. Mulligan, formerly of Salem.
 Geo. Anderson found the body today at 10 o'clock on the east side of the railroad across from the Park school house on the Paxton lot. The body was not quite stiff and he notified the coroner through B. B. Herriek, the county engineer. The remains were brought in and laid out in Clough's morgue.
 He slept last night in a bay pile on the Paxton lot and the owner of the place hitched up his team this morning to drive away and told his boys to let the man sleep, little thinking that he was in his last sleep. He was seen lying there by a number of persons this morning, but was believed not to be addicted to drink at all.
 After the remains were laid out he was identified by a number of persons who saw him about town Sunday and Saturday. He told several that he knew Jim Lamb in Ireland. Lamb is now in the Bohemia mining district. Told Ciel Nash that he was a schoolmate of Lamb's and wanted to find him. He has a moustache, and hair slightly gray, is between 50 and 60 years of age.
 His pockets contain papers that show he was a mining claim locator. He has papers signed Joseph J. Mulligan, and locating claims in South Mountain mining district, Owyhee county, Idaho. He was identified by County Judge Hubbard as a man who called on him Saturday for aid to go to his people in California. He had called twice Friday.

THE MAN DESCRIBED.
 Mulligan is full 6 feet tall. His hair is cut close, he has a full round face, large hands, is in good condition, had a working suit on, harvester's blouse and overalls. In his pockets was a book containing a great many names and addresses of lawyers and mining claim agents, also persons for whom he has located claims.
 He came to Salem last Friday from Portland and at once applied to Dr. Henderson, saying he had a bad case of heart disease. He said he wanted to live long enough to get to Shasta county, where his people are living. He told Dr. Henderson that he had recently been mining near Baker City and had been in Portland.

At Portland he had applied for aid to get to California, but the county judge would do no more than to offer to send him to the hospital. He had a heavy overcoat and carried a small satchel packed full of woolen clothes. He seems to be a hard working man of no bad habits and a great deal more than usual intelligence.
NO INQUEST.
 At 3 p. m. no inquest had been held, as it is not apparent that there is any doubt as to his death having been the result of heart disease. Deceased has no family or relatives here. Dr. Henderson identifies him as a man he prescribed for Saturday for heart disease.

Manager Cottle, of the Salem company, acknowledged receipt of it and received in return a handsome compliment from the Northwestern's home office at Milwaukee. Not a compact company had the civility to acknowledge receipt of the Northwestern National's elegant souvenir. OF INTEREST TO WHEELMEN.
Prospects of Another Ten Mile Race—State Fair Contests.
 A Salem business man, who is also a wheelman says he has been a champion of Card's from the start, but this last action of the management has disgusted him. He is now a Murphy man and glad he does not belong to the league.
 Another business man says he is a friend of Winters and is willing to put up a \$20 prize that Winters can beat Murphy one mile in a ten-mile race or run eleven miles to Murphy's ten.
 There should be no difficulty in arranging a perfectly fair and satisfactory race next time, with the experience that has been had. No rule can be shown to bar trailing, although general opinion is that there is a great advantage in it. As there is no way to divide trailing fairly, all will do best to ride abreast at a proper distance apart.
 Nothing has so stirred this community of late as the ten-mile amateur medal contest on bicycles. The public were about evenly divided on the merits of the case until the referee's decision in ordering a second contest after a ten minute wait, something that would never be done in a horse race on such short notice, and here one of the bicyclists was a mere boy. It has created more sentiment in favor of Chester Murphy than anything that has yet been done by that young man himself. The referee went just a little too far and has given Murphy and his friends an immense advantage. Card and Winters are popular and swift riders and will at the next race make a very pretty showing. If all three go, it will be the prettiest race ever seen on the grounds. The charge that the races have been jockeyed in the interest of the car lines is a trivial one, and the next race will see a larger crowd than has yet assembled. The referee's order in the last race, that there should be absolutely no loafing and no trailing, was complied with by both Winters and Murphy. They were neither to loaf or trail on penalty of being ordered off the track. That complied with, the referee had no right to declare it no race and order the boys to run it again inside of ten minutes. That was an outrage and the public so regards it. If either loafed or trailed, he could have been ordered off the grounds. But when they came within 14 seconds of a low time limit, considering the dusty track and half-mile against a heavy wind, there was no justice in ordering them to run again. It was a beautiful race, fairly run and honestly won by Murphy in time that is a credit to any amateur. As neither trailed or loafed, and no one claimed they did, in fairness the referee should have called it a race and awarded the medal to Murphy. In the state fair contests between amateur wheelmen Portland will be strongly represented and will come to Salem prepared to take all the prizes. With the best time of our best riders, such as Murphy, Card, Winters and Steiner, if he recovers from his broken collarbone, still in reserve Salem could give the metropolis many a surprise. The rider who has the true scientific theory of winning a ten-mile race should be the Salem champion on that occasion and if we have a man who can beat Murphy he should be produced and all the chance in the world given him to try it. THE JOURNAL does not care who it is. The public demand fair play, honest racing and no jockeying on the track or in the stand.

WHAT TO DO WITH IT.
 There are various propositions to use the \$4000 road tax money which the city has just received from the county.
 1. Use it to improve Willson Avenue.
 2. Use it to put the big bridge in first class repair.
 3. Use it to continue work on the city hall.
 The city need not use it at all. In fact, the money is already used and should be applied to cancel warrants drawing 8 per cent interest.
 It would go a ways to help put warrants at par and stop speculation.
 The city has a perfect right to use the money to repair the bridge. That need not cost over a few hundred dollars at present. But it is imperative that the city or county protect that valuable piece of property that is going to destruction from sheer neglect.
 This sum of \$4000 would be a handsome help to go ahead with work on the city hall.
 It is folly to abuse the council. Let us help the council. They have done their best and do not deserve abuse.
 No one should think of abandoning the city hall. Times are improving. Money is getting easier. The Salem school board recently got a loan to take up all warrants at a reduced rate of interest. The city can get money on the city hall. But taxpayers are almost universally opposed to issuing any more city bonds, or city hall bonds. There is only one other way to raise a fund to build the city hall and that is by a system of licenses on other business besides peddlers, saloons and expressmen. A general system of licenses would raise from \$5,000 to \$10,000 a year and in a few years would pay for the city hall. THE JOURNAL would cheerfully pay its share. Figures are shown us that range from \$200 a year to \$10 a year according to the business pursued. Unless money to build a city hall can be got in some other way, why would such a tax for the privilege of doing business not be as legitimate as to tax draymen, saloon keepers and peddlers? Why should not newspapers, tobacco stores, drug stores, banks, insurance agents, hotels, brokers, real estate agents, etc., etc., pay as well as those mentioned? Let not the capital city be without a city hall. Let it not be said we have abandoned such a creditable enterprise.
