River Intelligence.
 The steamer Majooc has been laid off her regular run for repairs and her screech whistle will not again be heard in these parts until the first of next week. Hereafter her leaving days will be from Portland Sundays and Wednesdays and from Salem Tuesdays and Saturdays. Another change will be inaugurated in that she will not make Salem her place of destination as formerly, but will continue up the river as far as Corvallis or farther according to the stage of the water.
 The river is now at the four foot mark though the probabilities are that it will not get very much higher unless the rain fall is considerable within the next few days.
 The steamer Eugene arrived this morning from Corvallis, with a full cargo of freight, for this place and Portland. The captain reported lots of water on the river and over three feet on the bars. She will leave Portland on her return trip next Sunday.

HANS HANDED HIMSELF.
 Inmate of the Asylum Dies by his Own Hand.
 Hans Neilson, a Dane 24 years old, formerly a resident of The Dalles, but for the last six months an inmate of the insane asylum, is no more.
 When the hands at the state farm were called to supper last night it was noticed that Neilson was missing and a diligent search failed to reveal his whereabouts. Those in charge concluded that he was off on some fresh but all right and would turn up in the morning. When the search was resumed it resulted in the finding of Hans in such a condition as to make the finder's blood run cold. He was located at last by one of his brother inmates, hanging fast to the limb of a large tree. He had chosen a very secluded spot to die and had gone about the work systematically. A strong piece of rope held his body from the earth and it is supposed that he had been dead at least 10 hours when discovered.
 The deceased came from The Dalles, where his parents reside. They have been notified and no disposition will be made of the remains until they are heard from. Neilson, when he arrived at the asylum was poor and emaciated and had a notion that the government of Denmark was in imminent danger of de traction by fees. He was violent towards his parents at all times. Previous to his death he grew fleshy and in better spirits, though at times he was melancholy in the extreme. His death was a great surprise to his keepers who regarded him in a fair way to recovery.
 A coroner's jury, at the inquest held at the asylum at 2 o'clock this afternoon, brought in a verdict showing that the deceased had met his death at his own hands.

Hops Galore.
 Salem is the important hop growing center of Oregon. A large portion of the hops grown in the state find buyers in this town. Most of the large hop dealers in the East have agents here.
 A dealer who for years past has been interested in hops in this section, but recently said: "There is not an important hop house in the East who have not buyers in Salem. In this regard Portland is not to be compared in importance, to this city. The crop this year has been very good compared with former years but I think the quality will fall a trifle below the average. Farmers are selling rather than storing and within the month the entire crop will be moved. They will generally be shipped to the East by rail though a few will remain on the coast. The price is surprisingly low but I cannot even hazard a guess what the future will develop."
 Several small lots have been bought this week from about Turner and other points, at 6 cents.

At the Prison.
 The brickyard at the state prison shut down yesterday, and now nothing remains to be done this season except to complete the building and to burn the last kiln. A very excellent quality and large number of brick have been turned out at a very trifling expense to the state.
 The penitentiary seems to be a sort of annex to the state fair, and every day the grounds and prison claim the attention and compliments of scores of visitors. The new part has been pushed so vigorously that the walls and interior mason work are all up, and it will be roofed in before the end of next week. Every detail has been scrupulously superior, and with the improved sanitary arrangements, it will prove both satisfactory and attractive.
 At noon today there were only 321 convicts in the state prison, a lower number than had been touched for many months.

 The application of F. W. Waters for an assistant deputy, was continued.
 The road supervisor was ordered to repair the T. L. Davidson road.
