BROWN WILL HANG.

The Murderer of Kincaid Doomed to Die February 15th.

ROSEBURG, Dec. 21.—Judge Fullerton today passed sentence on Samuel G. Brown, the convicted murderer of Alfred Kincaid.

Brown was sentenced to be hanged on February 15, 1895, between the hours of 6 and 7 o'clock a. m. At 1 o'clock yesterday Judge Fullerton passed upon the motion for a new trial. The court took up the allegations set forth in the motion and overruled all in detail.

Ex Congressman Sentenced. LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Dec. 21.—Jere Ha'son, the ex-congressman who was tried here several days ago and found guilty of forgery and perjury in several pension cases, was sentenced by Judge Edgerton to two years in prison at Detroit, or pay a fine of \$5000.

Judge Edgerton has refused a new trial to Jere Haralson, the Pine Bluff attorney convicted of pension, frauds. His sentence to two years in the Detroit house of correction and a fine of \$50,000, therefore will stand.

Haralson was a member of congress from Alabama during the reconstruction period.

Scarlet Fever Victim. BAKER CITY, Dec. 21.—Scarlet fever claimed a victim yesterday in the person of the youngest child of Walter Fernald, president of the First National bank. One other member of his family—a girl—is dangerously ill with the disease.

An Italian Bomb. ROME, Dec. 20.—A gunpowder bomb was exploded at the Austrian consulate here last evening. No injury to life or property was done. The object is supposed to have been revenge for the death of Emigrant Oberdan, as it was the anniversary of his execution, under the Austrian government's orders, in Trieste.

Storm in Nebraska. OMAHA, Dec. 21.—A terrific snow and rain storm prevails throughout Northwestern Nebraska and in the Black Hills. All telegraphic facilities with the Hills are cut off from this direction. No wires are working in Nebraska west of Chadron.
