On motion E. P. McCormack was authorized to see that the credentials of the club were properly presented and placed on record with the proper officers of the state club at Portland.

A fare of one and one third rate for the round trip over the Southern Pacific lines will be granted to all attending the convention at Portland, this includes visitors as well as delegates.

Mehama Encampment.

The committee of the Marion and Lane counties veterans' association met at Salem Monday to arrange, time, place and program for the annual encampment and reunion at Mehama.

The first encampment was held there last year and was attended by about five thousand people during the week.

The date fixed this year is July 10, encampment to last a week. The program for the reunion proper lasts three days, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, 12th, 13th and 14th.

The place selected is the beautiful grove on the south bank of the Santiam river just below the county bridge at Mehama. The program will be an unbounded later on. Good speakers, good music and good entertainment for man and beast will be provided.

At Sedgwick G. A. R. post, Monday evening a number of speeches were made and all endorsed the coming encampment. It will be warmly supported and largely attended by the Lane veterans.

Mehama encampment is coming to be regarded as a regular outing time and period of recreation and rejuvenation of the old soldiers of Marion, Lane and Polk counties.

Mr. Smith's Funeral.
