BIMETALLISM IN ENGLAND.

The announcement that Hon. Arthur J. Balfour is likely to be the next premier of England has an exceptional interest for the United States. Mr. Balfour is the leader of the bimetallic movement in that country and his speeches on the subject have attracted the attention of Emperor William of Germany. Mr. Balfour recently made a speech at the annual meeting of the bimetallic league, at which there was a great gathering of sympathizers. Among those present whose names are familiar on this side of the Atlantic were the Duke of Fife, who married the Princess of Wales' daughter, Earl Grey, Earl Fortescue, Marquis of Carmarthen, Lord Addington, Lord Willoughby de Eresby, Sir Donald MacFarlane, Sir Charles Tennant, Sir Samuel Montagu, H. R. Grenfell, formerly governor of the Bank of England, Alben C. H. Gibbs, the banker, and thirty or forty members of Parliament.

While this notable gathering indicates the feeling among statesmen, the report adopted says "great labor organizations have commended international bimetallicism to their members as of vital importance to the industrial life and prosperity of the country." One union alone, the Textile Factory Workers contributed \$2,500. A dispatch was read from the French bimetallic league urging on the good work.

Mr. Balfour's speech on that occasion is important in view of the position he may assume. He said, among other things:

"The cause that I, at all events have come here to support is the cause of a stable and uniform standard of value. The means by which I think that end may be best obtained—it cannot, I suppose, be completely attained by any human ingenuity, or the wisdom of any number of statesmen or economists; but the way in which it can be most completely obtained, according to the belief of those who hold what is called the bimetallic creed, is by bringing into a common use or circulation the two great mediums of exchange which have served mankind from the earliest times, and which never can be displaced without a world-wide disaster. Those are our objects and our opinions upon this subject have grown, as growing, and are likely to grow, not only in the city of London, but throughout the whole of the civilized world, which ought, surely, to act as one great common body in this matter, as in other matters effecting the common welfare. [Applause.]

"As a great sign of the change which is taking place in public opinion, I notice that you seldom now hear it openly asserted, at all events, by any body with any pretense to the knowledge of the subject, that bimetallicism, whether good or bad, is intrinsically impossible. I recollect the time when to announce yourself a bimetallicist, although almost every economist of repute at that very moment was a declared bimetallicist, was to write yourself down, in the opinion of those I am speaking of, as a faddist of the most dangerous order—as a man who wished two and two to make five, or that water should run up hill without the assistance of any mechanical contrivance. I think that phase of the controversy is passing away. There is now a vast body of most respectable opinion—I shall not say a word against it—which is still reluctant, or very reluctant, to accept bimetallicism as the practical solution of our currency difficulties; but the old view of that bimetallicism is an intrinsic absurdity has almost vanished from the area of controversy. And it would be strange indeed if it were not so, for in favor of bimetallicism you have the cooperation of history and experience in a degree which, I think, probably no other economic doctrine has ever received."

There is one allusion in his speech which is of special moment to states which have loaned large amounts from Europe. Mr. Balfour says:

"I am convinced that nobody within a mile of this building is so foolish as to suppose that the commercial interests of the country can be benefited on the whole by a fall in prices without

limit and without end, nor do I believe that any large body of men in the city of London would be so unscrupulous as to desire that debts owed to us by foreign nations should be artificially augmented by any change in the currency in which they have to be paid. I have heard a great deal in my time about the wickedness of 'inflationists,' and those in America who are called, I think, 'soft money men.' Well, I am not an inflationist nor a soft money man; but if I am to compare the alleged crimes of the inflationist and the soft money man with those of the persons who desire to see gold appreciate in order that we may maul the debtor, I am not sure of the two that the soft money man is not the better individual." [Great cheering.]

Mr. Balfour expressed the conviction that London, as the financial center of the world, must gain, rather than lose, by anything that puts the currency of the world upon any sounder basis than it is at present.

But an even more remarkable declaration was made by Hon. Evelyn Hubbard, who said: "I have become aware that bimetallicism involves the regulation not of price but of ratio, and that what was possible to the Latin Union cannot be impossible to Europe and the United States."

Among the many gems scattered throughout the speeches were the following, which will be recognized as the crystallization of a great truth:

"The English investor has learnt by sad experience the un wisdom of forcing on our foreign borrowers terms too onerous for them to bear, and is beginning to realize that it is better to have a silver debtor who pays you than a gold debtor who does not."

The Oregonian's admiration for the financial speech of Grover Cleveland's Secretary of the Treasury Carlisle, is only surpassed by its approbation of the utterance of the State convention of Republican clubs.
