Rose Show and Parade a Great Success.

There must have been ten thousand people on the streets last night. Considering that Salem people have had no experience and this was the first effort at parade the Rose Fair procession was a success.

THE QUEEN AND ATTENDANTS were the center of attraction of the parade and throughout the entire evening. The float was a grand success. In the center stood Miss Hutton and seated around her were the maids of honor, robed in pink.

THE STRAWBERRY EXHIBIT. The strawberry end of the show was not a success, partly from the fact only a few varieties are grown in this neighborhood. The berries which were brought in, however, were excellent.

THE COLLEGE EXHIBIT from Corvallis occupied a large table and attracted a great deal of attention. Prof. Coote's exhibits are always fine and this year consisted of 14 pelargonium geraniums, 9 calceolarias, 16 roses and about 40 varieties of pansies.

THE WILD FLOWERS occupied one whole side of the room and there were nearly 500 exhibits. Catherine Beckner led the list with 95 varieties, Bernice Williams being a close second with 92 and Condon Bean following with 83.

NOTES ON THE FAIR. The wild rose of Oregon now in full bloom was not recognized at the show, except in the children's collections of wild flowers.
