Board of Trustees Elect Officers for Ensuing Year.

ACADEMY GRADUATING EXERCISES

Conservatory of Music Commencement—Programme.

OFFICERS ELECTED.

Prof. W. C. Hawley was re-elected president of Willamette university by the board of trustees Tuesday afternoon.

The board of trustees for the ensuing year is composed of the following named gentlemen: President, Gen. W. H. Odell; vice president, F. R. Smith; secretary, John Parsons; treasurer, A. N. Bush. Dr. L. L. Rowland, Hon. J. H. Albert and Mrs. Mary Kinney were elected to succeed themselves as trustees for a term of three years.

The board adopted resolutions concerning the death of Revs. J. H. Rook and J. L. Parrish and adjourned to 9 a. m. Wednesday.

The board of trustees transacted routine business today adjourning this afternoon.

ACADEMY GRADUATION.

It was a few minutes after 8 o'clock Tuesday evening when the academy graduating class of 1895, the faculty, members of the board of trustees and State Superintendent G. M. Irwin took their places upon the platform at university chapel.

The chapel, especially the platform, was richly decorated with the college colors, cardinal and old gold, and above the class was suspended its motto: "Non Scholae Sed Vitae Studium," formed with letters consisting of lavender and white flowers. The program, as printed in last evening's JOURNAL, was successfully carried out, each number receiving an encore.

State Superintendent G. M. Irwin then presented the class after which President W. C. Hawley, awarded the diplomas. This was followed by an excellent selection from a male quartet consisting of Messrs. Wenger, Kundret, Ross and Ford. Members of the class are: Misses May Aitken, Mussa-Gier, Grace Pohle, Margaret Luckley, Helen L. Matthews, Edna A. Rugg, Messrs. John R. Parvin, Frederick Luckley, Wm. A. Morris, M. H. Savage, C. V. Fisher, and J. D. Plamondon.

At the conclusion of the program a reception was tendered the class at the home of J. D. Plamondon, on the corner of Center and Winter streets, where an enjoyable hour was spent. Miss Ida Harris and Mr. James Shivers were then presented by Pres. Hawley with medals won for the best club swing log at the university gymnasium last Saturday night.

COMMENCEMENT OF THE CONSERVATORY OF MUSIC.

The chapel was filled again this morning at the graduating exercises of the conservatory of music. The program, in every particular, was carried out, greatly to the satisfaction of all present.

The piano quartet, "William Tell" and "Der Fenschuh," by Miss Alderson, Miss Stahley, Mrs. Letich and Mrs. Walker were both finely rendered. Prayer was offered by Rev. J. C. Templeton, of the C. P. church. Mrs. Walker was first to play her graduating piece, "Sonata in A Flat" by Weber, showing skill and art in the rendition of her solo, which was greeted with applause.

The ladies' quartet—Mrs. Walker, Miss Alderson, Miss Beemer and Mrs. Letich—gave the sublime grand piece in the singing of "Joy Shall Ever Be Thine," and "Remembered."

The address, made by Rev. J. C. Templeton, was given with taste and expression and came in for a large amount of applause. "The Knight Was Brave" (aria) was grandly sung by Mrs. Walker.

This was followed by "Bisacolo No. 12" by Franz Liszt. Though difficult was memorized and played by Miss Stahley with good effect and artistic expression. The vocal duet by Mrs. Letich and Mrs. Walker, "Farewell, Oh Farewell," was beautifully sung, after which Prof. Farris gave an appropriate address and presented the class to the president to receive the honors of the university. Although but three in the class their work in the fine performance and standing gives them a very high place as a class in life, reflecting honor and credit to their instructors.
