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SALEM BOYS VICTORIOUS.

Carry Off Honors, Both at Oregon City and at Albany.

Although a small delegation of the Salem Y. M. C. A. participated in the contests at Oregon City yesterday with the Portland team, the local team was victorious in three of the five events contested for. All of the members of each team were requested to take part in each event. Wm. P. Babcock won the hammer throw, Charles Winters the mile run and W. C. Paige the hundred yard dash, the latter also carrying off the prize for the best all round athlete. Watkins, of the Portland team, won the pole vault and high jump. The afternoon program concluded with a match game of basketball in which the Salem boys were defeated the score being 4 to 0 in favor of the Portland team.

The Salem boys returned on the Salem local last evening much pleased over the result of the day's contests. There was an individual silver medal for the winner of each event and a prize for the one scoring the most points.

BICYCLE RACES AT ALBANY.

Salem was well represented at Albany yesterday in the postponed Fourth of July races, a number of her best riders being in attendance and participating in the various events. The first event of the afternoon races was one third mile Class A, with four starters, Bruce Burnett, of Corvallis; Biddell, of Albany; Watt Shipp and Walter Davis, of Salem. Owing to some misunderstanding the Albany man failed to start and Shipp's tire bursted leaving Burnett, of Corvallis, and Davis, of Salem, in the race. The latter won in 46.25 seconds, beating the time made by Class B riders four seconds in the same distance. The Class B riders, Sears, of Albany, and L. S. of Salem, then ran one third mile, Sears winning by a scratch in 50.2 seconds. The mile race for boys under 16 years of age was easily won by E. E. McClanahan, of Eugene, in 2:57. One mile, Class A, with four starters, same as first race, was won by Shipp, Davis second. Time 2:36. The five mile Class A was easily won by Shipp.

There was four starters, viz: Collins and Geo. Elkins, of Lebanon; Watt Shipp and Arthur Townsend, of Salem. Shipp took the lead at the start, which he maintained throughout the race, crossing the tape in 14:58, with Collins Elkins a good second.

The five-mile, Class B, was a trailing race between Sears of Albany and Lee of Salem, and was of little interest until the outcome. Lee won by half a length, in 14:48.

A band contest was held in the evening, at which the H. A. C. band of Salem was awarded first prize, \$75, the Albany band taking a second prize of \$25.

A large number of the Salem Four C's went to Portland this morning to witness the races, which were held there this afternoon. Just before the train pulled out the club yell, "Rah, rah, rah, zip, boom, rah; Salem Four C's, ha, ha, ha!" was given, making the air ring. Those going down on a 9 o'clock local were: M. M. Stock, F. R. Dearborn, C. E. Robin, Albert Jessup, Arthur Townsend, Walter Stolz, Dr. T. C. Smith, Jr., Johnnie Porter, Claude Taylor and F. A. Welch.

Charles Sears, of Albany, and Watt Shipp and M. J. Lee, of Salem, who are entered in today's races, also went down on the 9 o'clock local.

A PUBLIC WAREHOUSE.

The Old Agricultural Works to Be Converted Into Storage.

The building that has in years past been known as the agricultural works, and more recently occupied by the Churchill wash and door factory, will, in the very near future, become a public warehouse. It is now owned by the Salem Water Company, and Mr. Wallace has decided to put it into this use. Master Mechanic Johnson, of the Southern Pacific, was in the city today and will at once put into shape the sidewalk leading to this building, and put it into the best condition for loading produce onto the cars. The building is 60x165 feet in size, three stories high, and has two platform elevators run by water power. It is ample in size and could not well be better situated for this purpose. A responsible man will be placed in charge of the building and will receive hops as well as all kinds of produce on storage, issuing receipts therefor, the same as mills do for wheat. Only a minimum rate will be charged for storage, and this will give producers here an opportunity to command money on warehouse receipts. The building being brick, will reduce insurance to a minimum, and, on the whole, this arrangement must prove of great benefit to the farmers about Salem.
