RIVER NEWS.

Steamer Grey Eagle came up from Portland last evening with a very good load of freight. She remained at her dock in Salem last night and left for Portland at 7 o'clock this morning, as per schedule. She took a fair load of miscellaneous freight down the river this morning, besides about a dozen passengers.

Steamer Modoc arrived up from the metropolis last evening with a large load of miscellaneous merchandise. Among her freight last evening was the furniture for the newly-constructed Baptist church of this city. The pews are of handsome design. After discharging her cargo, the Modoc fell down the river to the Willamette Valley mills, where she took on a quantity of feed, after which she passed on to the Salem flouring mills and took on some flour. She left for Portland at 6 a. m. today with a large number of passengers.

Justice Court.

The case of Geo. J. Pearce, as administrator of the estate of E. C. Small, deceased, vs. Ben and Clell Hayden, for \$150.56 and interest from Feb. 22, 1894, was resumed in the justice court this morning. Closing arguments were made by J. A. Carson for the prosecution and Wm. Kaiser for the defense, and at noon court adjourned until 1:30 p. m.

When court convened this afternoon Attorney Carson began his closing remarks for the plaintiff and the case will not be concluded until late this afternoon.

The case of J. N. Skaife, administrator of the estate of D. M. Keen, deceased, vs. F. Nielson, charged with the larceny of 245 bushels of wheat belonging to the Keene estate, was to have been tried at 10 a. m. today in justice court, but as the attorneys are interested in other cases, the case has been postponed.

Probate Court.

Chas. M. Parmenter, as administrator of the estate of Henry Croft, has filed the final account with the county court, which body has approved the account and the administrator will be discharged upon filing the necessary receipts from the heirs after the distribution of property.

A MINING COMPANY.—John Gagen, M. G. Munley, and T. J. Munley are incorporators of the Block Butte Mining company of Grant county, today filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state. The object of the new company is to own and operate property, to locate and dispose of water rights, to enter a general merchandise business, to control wagon roads, telephone, telegraph and electric lines and bridges and to do a general running business. The capital stock of the incorporation is \$350,000 divided into 350 shares of \$100 each.

TOLEDO, Aug. 14.—The "Yaquina Post" (of Toledo) formerly owned and edited by "Col." Van Cleve, was today sold to Miss McKinney, of Portland, who will continue the publication under the same title.
