POLICE COURT NEWS.

Two Vagrants, One Drunk and a Laudanum Fiend.

Salem is being troubled not a little of late with vagrants, who are very careful to elude the officers. Yesterday afternoon Joe Myers, a vagrant, was released from the city jail and ordered to leave the city at once, but failing to do so he consequently spent last night in the city jail with the charge of vagrancy booked against him. He and Ed Walters, another of his type of individuals, received five days each. John Donahue was also released Friday afternoon, after serving out a five days' sentence for drunkenness, but was badly intoxicated within a few hours after being discharged. He got five days more.

A woman giving the name of Webb, charged with being intoxicated, was discharged this morning. Mrs. Webb is a laudanum fiend, using four tea spoonful of the deadly drug every day. When troubled with rheumatism Mrs. Webb was given laudanum to ease the pain, from which has sprung her awful appetite for the drug. This being her first offense, she was discharged, after being advised by Recorder Eides to let the drug alone. Her face presented a pitiful sight this morning, indicating a great deal of suffering. Her nerves were completely unstrung, and she was a fit subject for a hospital.

Street Commissioner W. J. Culver is having some work done on the bridge over South Mill creek on Twelfth street, near Oak. A railing will not be placed on either side of the foot bridge at present, although such improvement may be made in the future.

The vags and drunk were turned over to Street Commissioner Culver, who set them to work on the streets.

An Execution Sale—New Law Put to Use.

Sheriff John Knight by Deputy F. T. Wrightman today sold one piece of real estate on execution. In the case of Geo. Boyne vs. Geo. W. Swartz, R. L. Swartz and W. H. Anderson, 5.4 acres of land situated in the d. l. c. of Thos. T. Eyre in t 7 s r 2 w, was bid in by plaintiff for \$977.32.

The University of Oregon, Eugene, Oregon, offers free tuition to all students. Young men can obtain board, lodging, heat and light in the dormitory for \$2.50 per week. Roomers furnish their own linen. Young women are provided with board in private families at \$5 per week. Young women desiring board should address Prof. John Wilson, Eugene, Oregon, or secretary Young Women's Christian Association, Eugene. The University offers three baccalaureate degrees, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Letters with corresponding courses of study. The following shorter courses are also offered: An English course, leading in two years to a business diploma and in three years to the title graduate in pedagogy; An advanced course for graduates of normal schools leading to the degree master of pedagogy; A course of two years for teachers of physical education leading to a diploma which is payable in advance by all students.
