A BIG JAPANESE NAVY.

Iron Clads and Other War Vessels Ordered.

UNITED STATES STEAMER LABELLED

A Heavy Snow Storm Raging in Wyoming.

YOKOHAMA, Sept. 21.—The Japanese parliament has voted a credited of 200,000 yen for building four iron clad ships, ten coast defense vessels, and fifty torpedo boats.

U. S. Steamer Labelled.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—The department of justice today received a telegram stating that United States Attorney Aycock has labelled the steamer Commodore at Southport, N. C., and arrested her officers on suspicion of being engaged in furnishing arms and ammunition to the Cuban insurgents.

Sympathy for Cuba.

CHICAGO, Sept. 21.—The Tribune today prints letters from four United States senators and 42 representatives in reply to questions addressed to them whether congress should send a commission to Cuba to look into the condition of affairs there. They were also asked what, in their opinions, should be the condition of affairs there.

Replies were received from Senators John Sherman, of Ohio; Baker, of Kansas; William C. Chandler and J. H. Gallinger, of New Hampshire. Of the representatives, five are from Iowa, four each from Ohio and Pennsylvania; three each from New York and Indiana; two each from Kentucky, Kansas, Texas, Missouri and Arkansas, and one each from Connecticut, Maine, Mississippi, Wisconsin, Louisiana, Illinois, Nebraska, Alabama and Virginia.

In commenting editorially on the replies, the Tribune says: "As will be seen from the replies, there is a strong sentiment in favor of the dispatch of a commission to Cuba and also in favor of recognizing the belligerent rights of the insurgents as soon as it can be done consistently. There is only a little handful of members adverse to taking any action, and there were 15 others who were not yet ready to express their views, but the large majority of those addressed declare themselves strongly in sympathy with Cuba and in favor of recognizing the insurgents and aiding them as far as can be without violating international agreements. Senator Sherman, it will be observed, is in favor of recognition when a de facto government is established, but is opposed to annexation."

Starving and Crazy. NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—An immense cable dispatch to the Herald from Buenos Ayres, Argentina, via Galveston; Tex. states that Robert McCallum, who left this part in an 18 foot sloop June 13th, to cross the Atlantic, has been reported by the British ship St.ewart. He was starving and crazy.

Heavy Snows. RAWLINS, Wyo., Sept. 21.—A heavy northeast snow storm began early this morning. The snow is eight inches deep on the level and it is still snowing. There are fears for sheep still on the mountain ranges. Should the weather turn cold there would undoubtedly be heavy losses.

Foreign News. LONDON, Sept. 21.—A special dispatch from Shanghai states that the Chinese expect to retake possession of the Liao Tung peninsula about the middle of October.

The same correspondent reports that Russia has secured the privilege of the second Chinese loan of 100,000,000.

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—A special to the Herald from Berlin says: The kaiser has decided to follow Chancellor Hohenlohe's advice in regard to the socialist question and eschew the repressive measure urged by the Eulenburg faction.

LONDON, Sept. 21.—A dispatch to the Chronicle from Constantinople says that the minister of war has telegraphed to London for the admiralty charts of the Dardanelles. These are intended for the use of engineers in laying torpedoes.

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—A special to the World from Shanghai says: The German mission, near Swatow was looted today by 600 Chinese plunderers. It is impossible at this writing to obtain details.

Syndicate Lets Go. NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—The managers of the government bond syndicate have taken action which is regarded as a formal dissolution of the syndicate. The government, having no longer any need of its services, the managers sent out checks, which were received by the members of the syndicate this morning, giving them the profits of the operations of the syndicate. The profits are a trifle below 6 per cent.

Lynchers Acquitted. ELLENBURG, Wyo., Sept. 21.—The jury in the lynching case this morning returned a verdict of not guilty. On the night of August 13 a mob broke into the jail and two prisoners, father and son, named Vinson, were taken out and lynched. Five well known citizens were subsequently arrested and tried with the above result.

Lieut. Peary Returns. ST. JOHNS N. F. Sept. 21.—Peary Steamer Kite has been signalled off this part. All her flags are flying indicating Peary and his friends are on board.

Fatal Explosion. DAYTON, O., Sept. 21.—Paul Butterhorn and William Williams, inmates of the county infirmary, were killed by an explosion today.

Rain and Snow. SALT LAKE, Sept. 21.—Heavy rain last night was followed by snow which fell heavily up till noon today.

Mrs. Mary Grousbek was burned to death Thursday night on Row river, 10 miles from Cottage Grove. She was sitting by the fire about 5 p. m., nursing her baby, six weeks of age, when her dress caught from the flames. She put her baby in the cradle, but by the time that was done, she was all ablaze. Her husband was away from home, and her sister, returning from school, heard her screaming, but reached her too late, her clothing being all burned off. Her sister wrapped her in bed-clothing and immediately sought aid, but the injured woman died at 11 p. m.

She had been teaching school for 10 years, was a graduate, and had two diplomas. She was 28 years of age, and came from West Point, Minnesota.

The fruit drying establishment of F. R. Davis, 3 1/2 miles north of Salem, burned Friday. Besides the buildings, 8000 pounds of dried prunes were lost. The loss is about \$1200, with no insurance.

INSANE.—Geo. F. Christmann, aged 25 years, of Newburg, who imagines himself about to become President of the United States, was received at the insane asylum last night. Sarah Ann Dorrance, aged 28 years, of Newburg, was also received at the same institution last night. Sheriff Hale, of Clatsop county today brought Helen Svenson, aged 37 years, to the asylum.

THE AMERICANS WIN.

All the Great International Contests in New York

OF WORLD'S AMATEUR ATHLETICS.

Hundred Yards World's Record Broken.

NEW YORK, Sept.—After months of careful preparations the promoters of the international athletic contest, between representatives of the New York athletic club and London club, have been rewarded with a beautiful day, on which supremacy of British or American athletes is to be decided. The first event was the 88 yards run; Kilpatrick, of New York won; Horn of London, second; time 1.53 2/5. This breaks the world's record. The 100 yards run; Hefer, of New York, won; Brady of London, second; Crum third; time, 9 4/5 seconds.

Running high jump—Sweeney, of New York, first; six feet. Baltzsal, of New York, and Williams, of London, tied for the second place at 5 feet 10 inches. Sweeney made a new world's record, being 6 feet 5 1/2 inches.

THE DARRANT TRIAL.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 21.—The prosecution in the case of Theodore Darrant announced Friday that its witnesses will be through with direct examination next Wednesday. The crowd at the trial today exceeded that of any previous day since the case opened. Women outnumbered men two to one. Half an hour before court opened there was not even standing room. At the same time hundreds of citizens were held at bay by a squad of police and deputy sheriffs.

Adolph Oppenheimer, a pawnbroker, testified that between the 4th and 10th of April Darrant came to his store and offered for sale a ring with a small chip diamond. Witness selected the ring from those identified as belonging to Blanche Lamont and said that the ring was offered by Darrant. He had declined to purchase it and Darrant had taken it away with him. Oppenheimer stated that since testifying at the preliminary examination he had received two letters offering him bribes to modify his testimony. One of the letters offered him \$500 on condition that he state on the witness stand that he could not positively identify Darrant. He was not to see any one in connection with the bribe until after he had given his testimony, when the money would be paid to him. The second letter was of a similar character. The witness said he had turned both letters over to the police.
