

COMPLETE THE CITY HALL.

It is a great relief to the people of Salem to know that the new city hall is to be pushed to completion forthwith. The action of the city hall committee in recommending this, and the unanimous approval of the city council, disposes of what has for some time been a complicated question. The contractors have for the past year been in the unhappy predicament of not knowing what to expect. They have feared that owing to financial difficulties a halt would be called sooner or later, and would no doubt have been subjected to material losses if the city council had been forced to that alternative.

The building is now practically under roof and enclosed except doors and windows. The large stone steps and coping are now being put up, but the inside is still a great void. The contractors have drawn within less than \$15,000 of the contract price, and as it would take a large portion of this amount to temporarily or partially complete the building for occupancy, not to mention the loss the city might sustain by suspending operations, it was deemed wisest by all concerned to push the work through at once. This will give us a completed building, instead of temporary quarters for the city officers, police, jail, fire department, etc., at a very little more expense than the city would have been involved in by a compromise. Furthermore, this gives the contractors an opportunity to close their job without interruption or loss on their part.

The immediate expenditure of the additional \$15,000 will prove a heavy burden for our city at this time, but it seems to be the unanimous business judgment of the council that this will be economy in the end, and no doubt it will be. At all events it will be a great satisfaction to have the magnificent structure completed.
