RIVER NEWS. The Willamette now registers only .6 of a foot above low water mark, which is the lowest stage attained by the river at any time this season. At one time during the summer months it registered 7.

The O. R. & N. Co. have adopted a new schedule for their boats on the Willamette river, whereby the Gipsy makes three trips each week between Portland and Salem, instead of a daily trip from Mission Landing to Salem and return, as she has been doing for several weeks past, connecting at Mission Landing with the Emore from Portland. By the new schedule the Gipsy leaves Portland at 6 a. m. Sundays, Tuesdays and Thursdays for Salem and on the return trip leave Salem at 6 a. m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday, laying over Saturday in Portland. Despite the extremely low stage of the river, this little craft succeeded in crossing the many shallow places on the river without the least difficulty.

The Emore, which has been making daily trips between Salem and Portland and Mission Landing and connecting at the latter place with the Gipsy, has been placed on the Yamhill, and with the Modoc, which are two of the best boats on the upper Willamette, will handle the trade on the Yamhill river.

The Eugene, which has recently been leased by this company, will attend to the wheat shipping business of the O. R. & Co. on the Willamette, carrying wheat from Wheatland and other lower river points to the Portland Flouring mills at Oregon City. When the river raises sufficiently to enable this boat to travel on the upper river, a new schedule will probably be adopted by this company. Captain Geo. Rank handles the wheel of the Eugene, while Frank Gilbert an old steamboat man, well acquainted with the Willamette, will act in the capacity of purser.

The Grey Eagle continues to make daily trips to Mission Landing connecting with the Atona from Portland. She left Salem at 7 a. m. today with an average load of freight and usual large passenger list.

COURT HOUSE NEWS. Matters in Probate—Other Business Transacted.

THE DURRANT TRIAL

Is Slowly Drawing Near a Close.

ELEVENTH WEEK OF THE TRIAL.

Defense Will Have Its Evidence In by Thursday.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 8.—On the opening of the 11th week of the Durrant trial today, the defense made a final struggle to break down the testimony of the prosecution—a process which is expected to last three days longer. A few more students and several additional citizens will testify to Durrant's excellent reputation, and then the defendant himself will be called to the witness stand. It is the intention of the defense to have Durrant recount history of his adventures April 3 from the time he accompanied Blanche Lamont to school until the hour when he retired to rest in his father's house. It is understood that the defendant's testimony will be guardedly given, for the purpose of shutting out the cross examination of the district attorney. Under the law laid down by the supreme court of the state, a witness cannot be cross-examined, except upon actual matters brought out upon direct examination. The defense intends to leave no loophole for the attack of the prosecution. A schedule of time for the close of the trial is as follows:

Thursday. Attorney Deuprey will close the case for the defense; Friday and Monday will be occupied by District Attorney Barnes in rebuttal; Wednesday the opening argument for prosecution will be made, and Thursday, Friday and Monday the closing efforts of the defense will be made. The next day, the district attorney will close for the prosecution. It is confidently expected that Judge Murphy will charge the jury not later than the morning of Wednesday, October 23.

When the trial was resumed today. The defense recalled Mrs. Crossett and J. W. Phillips for additional cross-examination. The attorneys hope to obtain from them some admission that there was a bare possibility of their having mistaken some other person for Durrant. Whether they testify to this or not, it is expected to cut an important figure. Their evidence will simply open the way for impeachment of their testimony.

Judge Murphy today decided he had no power to punish Miss Carrie Cunningham, the newspaper reporter, for contempt of court. During the trial of the Durrant case last week Miss Cunningham was called to the stand by the defense and asked to tell where she obtained certain information relative to Mrs. Leak's testimony. When Miss Cunningham first refused to answer the question Judge Murphy announced that he would send her to prison for contempt. The court also reversed the ruling made last week by which the defense was deprived of the opportunity of asking Dr. Cheney if he was positive in his own mind that Durrant attended the lecture at Cooper Medical college on April 3. The defense this morning resumed the calling of witnesses to show the previous good reputation of Durrant.

Mine Explosion. LEADVILLE, Col., Oct. 8.—James Moore was instantly killed and Doc Morrison fatally injured by the explosion of giant powder in a shaft on the Matchless mine. The explosion occurred last evening but the men were not found until today. Morrison is at the bottom of the shaft all night in terrible agony, his eyeight been destroyed and his body frightfully mangled.

JAPS VICTORIOUS AGAIN.

Ten Thousand Black Flags Sure to be Taken. SHANGHAI, Oct. 8.—A special force of Tokio announces that a Japanese force in Formosa and has routed the main body, consisting of 10,000 men of the black flags. The engagement took place near river Tas Fina. The dispatch adds that the black flags leader, General Lieu Yung Fuch, is surrounded on three sides by Japanese troops and the capture of all his warriors are assured.

The papers are issued on authority article 900 Texas of the penal code, which provides that a conspiracy entered into in this state for the purpose of committing a felony in another territory or state.
