DRDER RESTORED IN ARMENIA

Ambassadors Will Give a Reply Saturday.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 8 .- Half Rifat Pasha, the Turkish minister of the interior, has been appointed grand vizier to succeed Kiamil Pasha, resigned. A new ministery has been as follows: Hali Rifat Pasha, grand yizier; Said Pasha, president of the council of state; Tewak Pasha, minister of foreign affaire; Hassan Pasha, minister of marine; Riza Pasha, minister of war; Menduh Pasha, minister of the loterior; Abruh Rahman Pasha, minister of justice; Babri Pasha, minister of finance; Arifi Pasha, minister without port follo.

The Turkish minister of foreign affairs has promised to give the embassadors of the powers a definite reply within two days as to what steps the porte intends to take for the restoration of order in Armenia, and to previde for the protection of Christians in that part of the Turkish empire,

A direct warning has been given the sultan that Europe will intervene to restore order in Armenia unless the Turkish government set promptly. Each day adds to the difficulty of the task at the porte. From Syria, especially, most disquieting rumors are e ming, and that they are based on fects is shown by the mobilization of 20 battalions of Rediffs out of 66 available, and the steps taken to dispatch them to that portion of Asiatic Turkey. This lends color to the report that the Armenians are receiving support from unexpected sources and the Turkish with an open and wide-spread reviit against the rule of the sultan. Arrests of Armenian and Turkish suspects are constantly being made here and else-

Possibly the most grave turn in the recent events lies in the fact, established beyond a doubt, that the dissatisfaction against the rule of the sultan has extended to the Turkish army and navy, and the palace officials are in a state of the greatest alarm. Nobody here would be astonished to hear in any moment of an outbreak in the palace itself, and in fact people well versed in Turkish affairs assert that only a prompt show of force upon the part of European fleets can avert it. Advices from Aleppo say Kurds belonging to the Halidah cavalry regiment plundered a caravan near that place. It is further stated that the Kurds in the eastern province joined the anti-Armenian movement and American missionaries are being ad vised not to expose themselves to dangers while the excitement lasts. At the instant of Mr. Herbert, British charge d'affairs, all consuls in the disturbed districts will be provided with guards.

served to them under the bill of rights adopted when Manitoba entered the confederation of Canadian provinces, in 1870 The Protestant contention has been that while reference was made to parochial schools in a rejected bill of rights submitted in 1873, there was no such reference in the bill rat:fied and adopted in 1870 by both provincial and dominion government. In an answer to this Protestant contention, the Catholics produced a manuscript, bearing date of 1870, which read that the rights of Roman Catholies to their schools should never be interfered with. This manuscript bore evidence of being definite and authentic, and seemed conclusive. Now, however, the government shows that the date of the document was really 1873, and a scientific photographic process reveals that the figure 3 was changed into a cipher. The original figure 3 is by a photograph revealed in faded luk like the rest of the document, while the cipher is in fresher and blacker ink.
