"Jacob Faithful" by Captain Maryat is reprinted by Macmillan & Co., London and New York, with new illustrations by Henry M. Brock, with an introduction by David

Hannay. We remember reading this book when but a boy and now had the supreme pleasure of reading it again to a circle of boys and ladies and its interest as a story seems to have abated not a particle in the thirty years intervening. Life on the Thames, England, early in the century was not what it is now. There was more drinking and the word "damn" is introduced at times when we would not do it now. But there are no nobler or more wholesome characters depicted in literature than Jacob Faithful and his friends on the river. The characters are true to life and move before the imagination as on the stage of real life when they are drawn. The morality of the book is not equalled by anything that is written nowadays for boys. There are rollicking songs, drinking bouts, defective characters, but back of it all stands a halo of uprightness, manliness and real stuff in the better men and women that move across its pages that convince anyone that life is worth living. We do not see how a family of boys can be properly raised without a copy of "Jacob Faithful" in the house at some time.

It is said the People of Maryland have just Sealed the Doom of Bossism by the complete overthrow of Boss Gorman, and that staunch Democratic state has gone Republican all around.

It shows what the American People can do when they get mad.

Haven't the People of Oregon had SIMON thrust down their throats quite long enough in the name of the Republican Party?

SIMON is now put forward as the SOUND MONEY apostle. The writer of this happens to be in a position TO KNOW that in the last Legislature this SIMON offered himself as a candidate for the United States Senate, in case Mr. Dolph could not succeed, as a friend of silver, and strong free silver men can be named to prove that SIMON pretended to be all right on that issue.
