ORIGUIT COURT SUITS.

Three New Actions Began in Marion County.

Nathman & Mangold have begun an action against Grant B. Manning for the sum of \$516.31 together with interest on \$203.55 thereof at 10 per cent from November 16th and interest on \$312.76 thereof at the same rate from January 29th, and on \$30.78 at the same rate from January 10th, and for \$90 attorneys fees. This money is claimed on a promissory note add for goods purchased at divers times. George Collins, plaintiff, vs. Chas. B. Moore, H. W. Cottin, Wm. England, H. B. Jordan and C. D. Gabrielson, defendants. The plaintiff alleges that on or about December 5, 1890, the defendants executed and delivered to him a promissory note for \$6,341 payable on or before December 5, 1892, with interest at the rate of 7 per cent; that on October 7, 1895, defendants agreed to pay the plaintiff interest on the note at the rate of 10 per cent from September 1, 1893, until the final payment is made; that since the notes were executed payments have been made reducing the amount to \$4,197.04, and that sum is claimed to be due plaintiff. For this he demands judgment against the defendants for the same and for the sum of \$400 attorney fees.

Seth R. Hammer and Hayden & McNary are attorneys for Mr. Collins, and J. and Henry W. Meyers are attorneys in the sum of \$10,000 in the undertaking for attachment. Olive S. England is plaintiff in a suit against her husband, Wm. England, the complaint being as follows: That on or between the 1st day of January, 1890, and the 1st day of November, 1895, at Salem, the plaintiff lent to defendant at divers times, at his special instance request, the sum of \$1,500 and defendant has frequently promised to pay the same, but he has not paid such sum or any part thereof. Wherefore, judgment against the defendant is demanded for \$1,500 and interest thereon at 8 per cent from November 1, 1895, and costs and disbursements. Mrs. England's attorneys are Carson & Fleming. J. A. Baker is the surety on undertaking for attachment in the sum of \$1,500. Shaw Shippers in Arms. Mrs. R. E. Wands makes affidavit that the Cornelius, Fryer and Towle fruits was well packed under the instructions of Oregon Fruit union and she approved same. Mr. R. E. Wands also corroborates the same with his recommendation attached namely—that Mr. Cornelius be restored, 44 crates making 172 and all charges for repacking be refunded to said parties—Mrs. M. Bloore, Lila Bloore, Lucy Bloore, and Zella Cole, Lizzie Cornelius together. Col. O. G. Cole and Geo. Towle make affidavits to the effect that the fruit was handled according to instructions. The Shaw people represent 50,000 trees, half of which will be bearing the coming season. If Mr. Wands recommendations are strictly followed the trouble will cease. I have received many communications asking for facts in the case but prefer not to publish anything further since I confidently believe the above will end the woe to this. G. B. C.
