Campos Crazy. CHICAGO, Jan. 15.—A special from Boston says:

Startling information has been received from Havana by a prominent Cuban tobacco-dealer here, whose interests in the island forbid using his name.

"There is a general opinion," says the letter, "both among insurgents and Spaniards, that General Campos has become demented. His actions, not only in the direction of the campaign, but his private and ordinary doings are such as to give good grounds for his belief.

"Gomez has no idea of attacking Havana, but his plan is to cut off the city's supplies. There is no doubt that fully half of the citizens and populace are Cuban sympathizers.
