In order to satisfy scientific men as to the real cause of Professor Helmholtz's death, says the London Telegraph's Berlin correspondent, a post mortem examination was made at the desire of his relatives, the chit results of which are as follows: As a consequence of the par-slytic strokes the left portion of the brain was considerably softened, while the right portion was perfectly normal and sound. The brain displayed unuanally numerous cerebral sinuations, such as are known to be generally observed in the brains of persons of very great intellect. The physicians and pathologists who conducted the examination were extremely interested in what they saw, and a cast of the brain was immediately taken. Other organs of the body showed some signs of disorder, but in his lifetime the deceased had not experienced any inconvenience there-

Electric Current In the Quilt. A new invention, called by its inventer the thermogen, consists of a quiit containing a coil of wire bent in the fashion of a gridiron, inclosed in insulating and nonconducting material, and imbedded in cotton, wool or other soft substance with a silk or woolen cover-

The resistance offered by the coll to the flow of an electric current through the wire produces heat in the same way that heat and eventually light are pro-duced in the filament of the glow lamp.

A uniform temperature of about 150 degrees F. is thus maintained, but in the event of the temperature rising be-yend that point from increase of pres-sure in the electric mains a fuse instantly melts and automatically shuts off the current. How Suffrage Is Restricted In Canada The Canadian restrictions on suffrage are peculiar. In order to be entitled to vote, not only must one be a male British subject 21 years of age and have lived in the Dominion at least a year, but he must also have been the owner of real estate or the occupier of a rented house or business property for the same time. If he owns real estate in a city. it must be worth \$300, if in a town \$200, and if elsewhere \$150. If he neither owns real estate nor occupies real estato as a tenant, he can vote if he earns \$300 a year, or if he be the son of a farmer or real estate owner and live at his father's home. An income voter is not required, as all other voters are. to live a year in the district where he wants to vote, but can register at any time. - Albany Times-Union.

Beans For Garget. An English exchange says: The good offices of beans as a preventive of garget in cows or sheep are little known and not so fully appreciated. Two bushels of oats and peas, with 12 quarts of beans added and ground together, and a third by weight of bran added, feeding two quarts of the mixture night and morning from the time the cow is nicely dried off till a week or ten days after calving, will carry her safely through free from swollen udder or garget if she does not ake cold at the critical time.

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
