SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 24.

A 4 Mill Tax Recommended for 1896 by the Board.

At a meeting of the school board for district No. 24, held last night the subject of a tax levy for the current year was closed so far as the board is able. A 4 mill tax will be recommended in its report to the annual meeting.

The following facts are taken from the annual report, which will be submitted to the district meeting at the city council room tomorrow (Wednesday) night:

Total receipts, March 5, 1895, to Jan. 1, 1896, \$33,818 39
Total expenditures, 33,818 39
Total indebtedness, exclusive of bonds, 9,606 26
Estimated expenses to July 1st, \$14,839 00

A comparison of the financial condition of the district on the 1st inst. with its condition one year before shows a very gratifying decrease of debt amounting to \$6,645.50 and a reduction in the expense estimate to July 1st of \$7,054.74.

The board expects to receive from the state \$2500 and from the county \$6500—forming a total of \$9000—which deducted from the grand total of indebtedness, estimated to be due July 1st of \$24,445.26, will leave a deficit of \$15,445.26 to be raised to carry on the schools to that date.

The total valuation of assessable property in the district for the year 1895—as certified to by the county clerk—is \$2,063,711, being \$364,426 less than that of 1894.

A levy of four mills on this amount will produce the sum of \$11,854.84. Of this sum a delinquent tax of \$1,5000 is estimated by the board which will leave a balance collectable of \$10,354.84, which deducted from the above deficit will still leave a balance of \$5,090.42 against the district on July 1, 1896.

In order to pay the bills of the district in cash, as has been done during the past year, it will be necessary to borrow about \$11,000 in addition to the \$8,950 already owing, before the taxes come in in sufficient volume to meet the bills. This will make nearly \$20,000 of borrowed money on which the interest rate is at 9 per cent per year. The item of interest has cost nearly \$1,240 since last March and by the 1st of March next will have amounted to \$1,750 per month for the year.

It is necessary for the district either to borrow money or levy sufficient tax to pay its bills as they become due, for the board deems it inexpedient and injurious to the credit of the district to issue, in payment of its current expenses, non-interest bearing warrants payable at some indefinite future.

The board asks the tax-payers to bear in mind, also, that after the 1st of July next and before the taxes for next year are received there must be paid for wood \$750 and for interest on bonds \$1,460 and sufficient to carry on the schools for the months of October, November, and December of 1896, and January, February, and March of 1897, which over and above the receipts for delinquent taxes, tuition, fees, etc., will be for salaries and incidentals about \$13,281 or a total of \$15,500.

It is the opinion of the board that a 4 mill levy will be sufficient to carry on the schools, without further involving the district heavily in debt.

THE ALASKA FEVER.—Salem has not a few men who are becoming interested in the matter of going to Alaska, and particularly to the gold fields in the upper Yukon country. Among those contemplating a trip in the near future are Bud Chapman, Jack Harkins and Jerome Cavanaugh. These men believe there is "millions in it." The Journal is taking steps to secure information on the subject of this country, matters pertaining to transportation routes, and rates of travel.

BRIDGE TOO NARROW.—Sunday evening as Nevt. Jermain, of Howell Prairie, was driving home, one wheel of his buggy slipped off the side of a culvert bridge near Parkersville. The team ran away, but were soon captured at the White school house. W. T. Rausen assisted Mr. Jermain to get his buggy out, and no great damage was caused. Mr. Jermain is now an advocate of 24-foot bridges across culverts.

A GUARDIANSHIP.—County Judge W. C. Hubbard yesterday appointed Mrs. Mary A. Cooley guardian of the persons and estates of Albert H., Maude M. and Cassie V. Cooley, minor children of James Cooley, who died on December 21, 1894, leaving property of the value of \$3000. Each of the heirs is entitled to a one-eighth interest in the estate.

FINAL ACCOUNT.—In the estate of Samuel Burkholder estate, deceased, Jacob G. Miller, Aurora, administrator, March 2d set for hearing of objections if any to final account.

CASH WARRANTS.—County Treasurer Minto is still cashing warrants and if taxes come in soon they will be cashed right along.

Sousa's Great Tour.

The coming concert in this city February 19th of John Philip Sousa's Concert Band will be one of the features of his grand trans-continental tour which he opened at Washington on January 5th, and at which the famous newspaper men's organization, the "Gridiron Club" of which the March King is a member, attended in a body as a compliment to their comrade. The present tour of the great Sousa will stretch clear across the American continent, and include Oregon and the whole Pacific slope. The tour will be interrupted when the organization gets in the east again, to allow the March King to supervise the production of his new opera, "El Capitan," which he just finished and which will be produced at Boston in next April. Then the band will resume its travels again and invade the British provinces. The soloists of the tour will be Miss Myrta French, soprano, Miss Carrie Duke, violinist and Mr. Arthur Pryor, trombone. Sousa's own marches will be the features of all his concerts.
