CHICKENS SEIZED.
Said to Belong in a Consignment From Oregon.

Assistant Secretary McCurrie of the society for the Prevention of cruelty to animals yesterday found twenty crates in front of the Clay-street market ticketed to A. Fordera & Co. in which were crowded hundreds of chickens in the most distressing condition possible. Some were dead, many had broken legs, while others had the feathers and skin torn off in places. Some of the fowl were feeding on the weaker and maimed ones. Mr. McCurrie summoned Secretary C. B. Holbrook, and together they made an investigation that throws a strange light upon the handling poultry for markets of this city.

After Fordera tried to explain that he would pay for the live chickens only and that he got them from Jacobson & Co., Mr. Holbrook had the crates opened and all the maimed and suffering ones killed. Fordera told his boy to take the dead birds and put them in the hole. Mr. Holbrook thought it might prove interesting to find out who takes them out of this receptacle.

When Jacobson was seen he put the blame on the fact that the Palace chicken car that brought the 4800 consigned to him from north, had been delayed by a washout, and said he was trying to get them out of the car as fast as he could. He has no explanation to offer as to why he put so many in a crate, other than the fact that he did not have a sufficient number of these receptacles.

Mr. Holbrook said: "It is the worst case I have ever seen. In such charges one puts the blame upon another, and it is not always easy to locate the offender. We had one early in the week, when a case was reported by a Health Inspector, who said that Dr. Lovelace had sent him to the Market Inspector, who said he had nothing to do with commission houses, and in the meantime feverish, sick chickens, taken from overcrowded coops, are killed for the San Francisco market." Secretary Holbrook will continue his investigations, and some arrest are likely to follow.—S. F. Chronicle.
