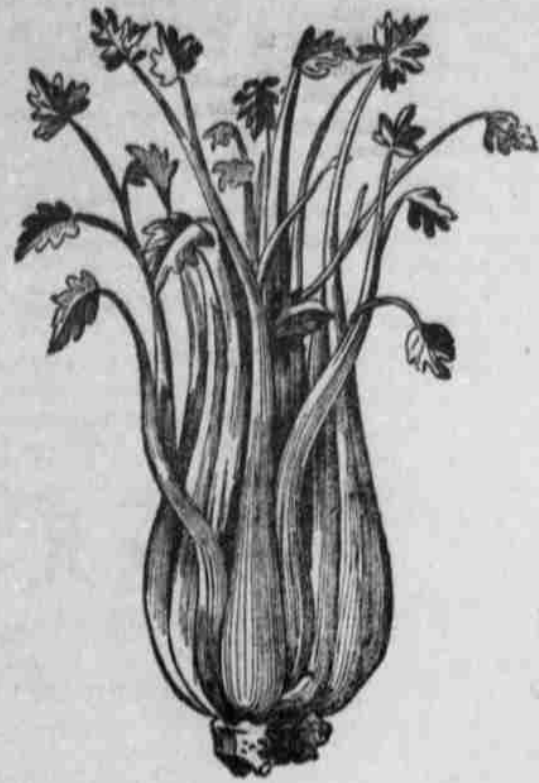

PORTLAND RING—HANDS OFF!

The signs begin to appear that the old Portland ring will seek to dictate legislative methods in the coming county conventions. Isn't it time for those fellows to take their hands off this state?

So long as the Portland ring can get a following in the state it will be a power for evil in Multnomah county. Strip it of its support in the interior of the state, and it is powerless for harm at home. The ringsters are then thrown back upon the people who know them best, and they will deal with them. So long as they can control either branch of the legislature, their ambition will be to rule Portland, not with home rule, but with state aid.

What claim have the Portland ringsters to control Republicans in the interior of the state? Is it their ability, sagacity and intelligence? In the last legislature they did not possess enough of either to do anything, and would not let anyone else do anything if they could help. They can show no good government and only bad financeering at home. Let them keep hands off the rest of the state.

Let members of the legislature be put up who are responsible to the people of their own counties instead of to the Portland ring. The Portland gang made the last general appropriation bill what it was, put in slices for all the ring senators and tools who served the machine, and are directly responsible for the increase of the state tax levy to 4.8 mills. Give the people of Oregon home rule for the people instead of machine rule for the Portland gang.

COUNTY POLITICS.

The Salem Statesman prints a column review of candidates for county offices. It says Henry Hall of Woodburn and Sam Kerr of St. Paul are not candidates for county commissioner, and it begins to look as if J. F. Anderson of Howell might succeed himself. Levi Brower of McCleay is mentioned also.

For sheriff it says the most active candidates are Deputy F. T. Wrightman and Thomas Sims, of Salem. David H. Looney of Jefferson, J. E. Hammond of Silverton, George Whitney of Woodburn.

For county clerk and recorder there is no opposition. Deputy Clerk R. D. Allen and Ed. McKinney are mentioned as possible candidates for clerk two years hence.

For treasurer Jap Minto, (serving part of a term by appointment), J. F. Steiwer of Jefferson, Scott Bozorth of Salem, A. W. Drager of Yew Park and J. H. McCormick of North Salem are mentioned.

For county superintendent the present very competent official, who has had two terms, declines to run. D. W. Yoder of Woodburn, E. H. Anderson and P. S. Knight of Salem, G. W. Jones, principal of the Turner schools are mentioned.

For county judge W. C. Hubbard, Fairfield, present incumbent; Ed T. Judd of Aumsville, W. T. Grimm of Hubbard, G. P. Terrell of Mehama and S. T. Richardson of Salem are in the field.

One J. F. Wisner, a Klamath county Populist, is reported in the Independent as follows:

"He brought to the notice of the meeting the fact that while it only cost the city of Salem, comprising 700 square miles, \$5,000 per annum to light the city with electric lights, the last legislature appropriated \$36,000 to defray the expense of lighting the state grounds and buildings for one year."

The legislature appropriated \$36,000 for two years for lights at the state institutions and grounds, or \$18,000 a year, and the rate charged for the arc lights and incandescents used is the same per month as is paid by the city. The only difference is the state buys more lights than the city. The bill authorizing and directing a contract to be made at those rates for ten years was passed by the legislature before the last—not the last. Our Populist friend is never so happy as when he is lying about the last legislature.

POLITICS FOR REVENUE ONLY.

Charles A. Cogswell announces through the press of the State that he is no longer a Democrat. Mr. Cogswell is a citizen of Lake county, and represented Crook, Klamath and Lake counties in the senate for eight years. He is a lawyer, and also an ambitious, able, shrewd little man. His defection from the Democratic party will not materially disrupt the organization or interfere with any arrangements already completed for the June campaign. For years Senator Cogswell has done nothing more to signalize his democracy than to vote for the caucus nominees of his party at Salem; in his legislative action he has always worked and voted with the Republicans. Democrats have been forced to leave him out of their calculations when they needed him. He is a warm friend and admirer of Joe Simon, and can be expected to receive early recognition in the inner circle of the Republican organization. Since Grover Cleveland took office Mr. Cogswell has been seeking a federal appointment. For some reason he failed to get one. He had an ambition to be United States district attorney. His failure to secure recognition at Washington may have had something to do with his change of heart, as he is not in politics for his health. Mr. Cogswell's public announcement simply means this: "If there are no offices for me in the Democratic party I can no longer continue in it. I am therefore a Republican." —Astoria Budget, Dem.

THE PRIMARIES.

No secret primaries should be tolerated by Republicans.

Let the primaries be held open and public. Let delegates be chosen by ballot and give all Republicans or those wishing to vote the Republican ticket a chance to vote.

Let each man's name be recorded as he casts his ballot. Then let the ballots be counted and preserved with the tally sheet.

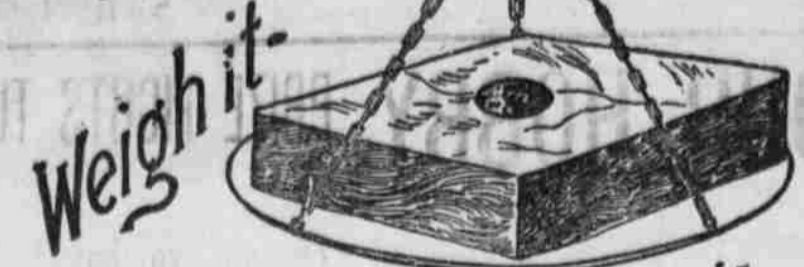

Every Republican in every precinct should have a chance to vote at the precinct primaries and have his vote count.
