All About the Primaries and Conventions

OF DIFFERENT PARTIES.

The Campaign Warming Up on All Sides.

The Republicans of Yew Park precinct meet at Pringle school house next Wednesday evening at 7:30.

Precinct committee men or working Republicans will confer a favor by sending in notices of meetings.

Republicans of South Salem precinct meet at the old school house Saturday evening next. Judge Bigger will speak.

See call for Republican primaries and convention. Prepare to attend and see that representative men are chosen delegates.

Richard H. Rutherford of Marion was in town today. He is one of the Rutherford brothers of Marion, the owners of the famous horse "Oregon Wonder."

Senator Lon Gesner takes the same non-committal view on the U. S. senatorship as does Senator Hobson. Senator Patterson is quite outspoken in the senatorship. He is for John H. Mitchell.

W. H. Savage says there are several slates in the field in Englewood. The sentiment of the people is strongly for a Mitchell delegation in the legislature, there being but one Dolphin man in the precinct so far as he knew.

Thomas Benton Patton of Macleay is a candidate for assessor, and is claimed to have considerable following in the country. He was elected in 1886 over Barney Simpson by about 200. Mr. Patton assessed the county in 1887 and 1888 and four years ago had the second largest vote in the convention.

The Republicans in Salem precincts are consulting as to slates of delegates and the strongest men are being put to the front. In Salem No. 3 no agreement as to a slate has been reached. It is the large ward and has a big floating vote. There has been money used in this ward in the past and it is to be hoped a satisfactory slate can be arranged and a fight avoided in which the floating vote would be bid for by the rival factions.

Senator Wm. H. Hobson of Stayton was in town today and started for home this evening. He said he had not committed for or against Senator Mitchell and there was no opposition in sight. But before the legislature met there might be great changes. In the last legislature he was a Dolphin man, but finally changed to Waldo. He did not know whether Mr. Dolphin would be a candidate or not. If he was a candidate he was keeping mighty still about it. He was not in town on politics but purely on business.

THE POPULISTS hold their primaries in Marion county, Saturday, March 21, county convention at Salem March 25, state convention at Salem 26 and March 27. Headquarters for delegates at Hotel Willamette. Mr. McCleary has appointments at Salem March 19, Riekey school house March 20, Chemawa March 21, Fruitland March 21st.

WALTER LYON IN OREGONIAN. There is no lack of interest manifested in Marion county in the coming Republican primary elections, and county, district and state conventions. In the rural precinct it is pretty well settled as to who will be sent as delegates to the county convention, and the numerous candidates for county offices are canvassing by day and figuring by night upon the result of the convention vote, based upon the latest estimates. The candidates for district attorney and congress are also casting about for delegates to the Albany convention. For the district attorneyship, Marion county has candidates in the persons of Alva Condit, the present deputy of James McCain, and John A. Carson. J. H. McNary has also been mentioned as a candidate for the attorneyship. The friends of Tilmor Ford and T. T. Geer are alive to the interests of each as congressional candidates, and it is said that if neither of these can capture the nomination, Marion county has another son upon whom Hermann's mantle may fall. It is yet problematical who Marion county will support for congress. Some candidates residing within the county have friends here, but a favorite son will doubtless command a majority of the county delegation.

THE PORTLAND FIGHT.

A Salem paper suggests that the struggle at the coming primaries and county convention in Portland does not concern Marion county or the rest of the state.

With nearly one-fourth of the voting strength of the state and more than one-third of the convention strength of the Republican party, bossism and ring rule in Portland does mightily concern the people of Oregon. Any honest attempt to overthrow it, if even to set up a new machine, interests the people.

The old gang there who wanted to make Mr. Dolphin their personal tool, and proposed nothing but specious reform bills in the interest of local capitalists in the last legislature, have run that city and county hopelessly in debt, have given the city rotten streets and defective water-works and then wanted a six-year dictatorship or protectorate established without recourse to the people, to legalize all their rascalities and perpetrate new ones.

The fight at Portland does concern Marion county and all the rest of the state. The men in Marion county who are indifferent to the Portland fight, or who are still inclined to fight the battles of the old ring, will learn from the people that the matter does concern them.

THE KENTUCKY FIGHT

Cloak Rooms Cleared by the Sheriff.

GOV. BRADLEY SCORED.

The Turmoil Growing Worse from Day to Day.

FRANKFORT, Ky., March 13.—At 11:30 a. m. Sheriff Armstrong received instructions from Governor Bradley, to clear the senate cloak room, in which were Senator Blackburn and friends, including Jack Chinn. The Blackburn leaders at once drew up a resolution of rebuke to the governor, which the senate adopted. Petrie, a Republican, asked that a committee be appointed to confer with the governor and see if such an order had been issued.

Bronston bitterly scored the governor. Goebel said the governor had no right to interfere with the rights of the senate. "I for one," he shouted "am ready to protect my own rights and privileges." Governor Bradley denies having given the sheriff any such orders as stated. Senator Bronston has begged the governor's pardon.

A QUORUM.

CINCINNATI, March 13.—A special Frankfort, Ky., says St. John Boyle will be elected United States senator. This will certainly be done before the legislature adjourns. Senators Sherman and Hoar and Speaker Reed have wired Boyle that, since the death of Weissinger, 69 members constitute a quorum. A joint assembly may pass on the right of the expelled senators, James and Walton to have their votes recorded, yet it has no right to do so. The United States senate is the only tribunal vested with that power.

In joint assembly today a roll call showed 128 members present. Necessary to choice 65. The ballot resulted Blackburn 50, Carlisle 13, Buckner 1. The Republicans again refused to vote. There was no quorum. Populist Poor refused to vote. The chairman announced no election, and the assembly adjourned.

An Alaska Expedition.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 13.—A mysterious expedition left for Alaska yesterday. The steam schooner Excelsior was chartered and so quietly was the matter carried out that the owners of the vessel, C. A. Hooper & Co., knew hardly anything of the plans of the managers.

Last year some wealthy citizens of Boston heard rumors of immense gold-bearing deposits at Cook's inlet, and A. Pennock an experienced miner, was sent to view the country.

Pennock made a thorough search for the shining metal, and, in his opinion was successful beyond question. He, with a few friends, at once measured over ten acres of land which showed gold from the grass roots on the bedrock. Water rights were secured and the prospectors washed out a few ounces and started for Boston. The gold is both fine and coarse, and the mint values it at \$16 per ounce. The Boston investigators incorporated as the Alaska & Boston Company, and \$100,000 was paid in. Henry E. Spaulding and G. W. T. Braman, the latter being at the head of the West Side electrical roads, came to this city and began preparations for the expedition.

The destination of the expedition has been carefully guarded, but it is known the objective point is about twenty miles from Resurrection creek, at the head of Cook inlet.

River and Harbor Bill.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—It is now generally thought that the river and harbor bill will carry about \$12,000,000 for the whole country, though it may fall below that. This is what the chief of engineers of the army says is absolutely necessary to properly carry out the work. Representative Hermann says that, whatever the amount will be Oregon will get her share, and perhaps a larger per cent of the whole amount than ever before. The danger of losing the bill has spurred the members on to keep at work perfecting it, so as to bring it in as early a date as possible.

Representative Hermann has been preparing a project for Yaquina bay, which he hopes to have incorporated in the bill, which will place the work under the contract system and provide for the future expenditure of \$1,025,000 to complete the work, as provided for in the report of the engineer commission which has recently examined the bay. Mr. Hermann says that, if there is any project put under the contract system, Oregon shall have at least one contract work.

Mr. Hermann is making an especial fight for the Willamette project. This and the improvement of the Yamhill river he wants to secure provision for in the coming bill. Another work regarded of great importance is the Cascade locks.

ELECT SENATORS DIRECT.

Mitchell's Bill to Amend the Constitution of the U. S.

The Democratic Delegates Against Cleveland and for Silver.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—At a full meeting of the committee on privileges and elections today Senator Mitchell, the chairman, was authorized to report his joint resolution proposing an amendment to the constitution of the United States, providing for the election of United States senators by a direct vote of the people. The vote was 5 to 4 in favor of the amendment. Three Republicans and two Democrats voting in the affirmative, two Republicans and two Democrats being against it.

AGAINST CLEVELAND.

CHICAGO, March 13.—A special to the News from Washington says: The six delegates chosen by the District Columbia Democrats to the Chicago convention go uninstructed as to a candidate and the currency question. A resolution condemning President Cleveland was voted down 29 to 27, but the delegates are bitter enemies of the president. While a free silver resolution was tabled in the committee by a vote, the delegates are nearly all free silver men.

Peace With Menelik.

ROME, March 13.—Negotiations with King Menelik have been opened. It is anticipated that peace will be concluded before long, and the war office has countermanded the instructions sent to various points for hurrying forward reinforcements to Africa.

A Life Sentence.

PORTLAND, Or., March 13.—Theodore Luebke, recently convicted of the murder of William Solomon, was today sentenced to life imprisonment.

New Mexico to Be Admitted.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—The senate committee on territories today authorized a favorable report upon the bill for the admission of New Mexico as a state.

MINERS TRAIN WRECK

Nearly One Hundred Men Are Injured.

BLUE JAY STOCK JUMPS.

Great Excitement on the Denver Mining Exchange.

BRAZIL, In. J., March 13.—A passenger train on the Centre Point branch of the Vandalia line, was wrecked at Centre Point, south of here, this morning. The engine and miners' car, containing about 100 miners, had gone to the side track to make a running switch, when other sections, composed of the caboose and passenger car, got beyond the control of the trainmen, and, shooting down the heavy grade, collided with the first section. In their efforts to escape, the miners trampled one another frightfully. Nearly all were more or less seriously injured.

MINING STOCK UP.

DENVER, March 13.—A big demand for Blue Jay stock caused greater excitement on mining stock exchange today than has been seen in many days. The stock started to sell at 6 cents a share and advanced by leaps and bounds, closing at 27 1/2 bid. Over four hundred thousand shares were sold.

Belgian Bimetallism.

BRUSSELS, March 13.—The premier, M. P. Dessemaeyre, replying to the question urging the re-establishment of international bimetallism, said it was easy to acknowledge the importance of international bimetallism, and assured the Chamber government would acquiesce in any measure insuring by international agreement the stability of monetary exchange between gold and silver.
