THE RING FINDS AN ORGAN.

The Corvallis Times remarks "those persons in Corvallis who aspire to be members of the Republican party in Benton are determined that no Republican shall be nominated for the Legislature who is not tethered, body and soul, to the kite of Senator Mitchell."

This statement is remarkable for its brazen effrontery. No one knows better than the Times that those who aspire to be bosses of the Republican party in Benton county are opposed to Senator Mitchell. It is the people of Benton county, regardless of party, who desire Mr. Mitchell's re-election. The politicians are secretly conspiring to defeat the will of the people in this matter, and the latter are determined to see that a legislator is selected who will represent them and not a Multnomah county ring. The would-be bosses, knowing the attitude of the Republican press of the county, have determined it advisable to speak into the easily accessible ear of a Democratic organ, and it editorially chants their doleful plaints. It will be well for Times to remember that the Republican party considers itself thoroughly capable of selecting its own nominees without assistance from a Democratic newspaper.

The Times goes on to state "if they succeed in their designs the especial business of the legislative candidates eliminated will be, if elected, to seek first, last and all the time the election of Mr. Mitchell to succeed himself as U. S. senator. Neither God nor the framers of the state government ever intended that the legislature should be elected for the single purpose of re-electing senator Mr. John H. Mitchell."

This statement in effect means that a man is unfit for a legislator, whose mind is not a perfect blank regarding the senatorial question. The Times is simply talking nonsense. A man can be thoroughly qualified for the duties of a legislator and at the same time have an expressed preference concerning the senatorship. The people wish to have a voice in the choice of their U. S. senator and the only effective way they have of making their wishes known is through the selection of the legislator who will act according to their desires. The Republican convention can be depended upon to select no man as a candidate whose sole qualification is the favorable opinion of Mr. Mitchell. The convention will doubtless consider that a necessary qualification, but by no means the only or most important one.

The legislative candidate must be able to do all things, willing to and capable of transacting the legislative business of the state, speedily and wisely. The state has no need of politicians in the legislature. It needs men of good business sense, well versed as to the needs of the different industries, and having enough common sense to know that a proposed law will do

A Republican convention for the state of Oregon is called to meet in the city of Portland, on Thursday, April 9, 1896, at 11 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the presidential electors and state and district offices, except congressmen, and of electing four delegates-at-large to the Republican national convention, and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention. 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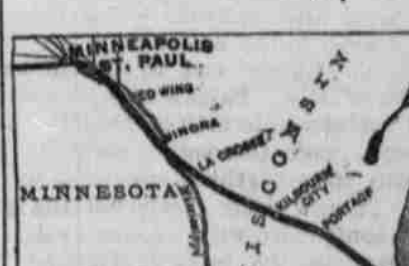
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
