IMPORTANT RESOLUTIONS.

Besides a resolution endorsing W. W. Steiwer for joint senator, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted by the Republican primary held at Fossil:

Whereas, it is the duty of the Republican party to keep in close touch with the people and to put its trust in and hearken to the voice of the common people. That all matters of importance affecting the general welfare, and especially local grievance and wrongs that need remedying should find free expression at the primaries, to the end that discord may be silenced, justice done and harmony prevail.

Therefore be it resolved, by the Republicans of Butte Creek precinct, Gilliam county, Oregon, in primary assembled, on this 21st day of March, 1896.
