A PLEA FOR BARKLEY.

All the Republican legislative ticket in this county is publicly and privately pledged to Senator Mitchell's re-election. But owing to his pronounced views, a particular fight is being made on Elder Barkley. He is to be traded off by the so-called "sound money" element.

ONE WAY TO DO IT.

There is much talk of how to circulate silver. The 'Frisko News-Letter has one way:

There is a simple and safe way to get the government's uncomfortably large stock of silver into circulation that would have been adopted long ere this were not the debtor class intent upon another purpose. They want "free and unlimited" coinage in order to pay their debts with fifty cents on the dollar, and are not, therefore in favor of getting silver into circulation in a way that would maintain its parity with gold. More honest people there are who desire to extend to the white metal, as an American product, all the help it needs, and they see a way to do it. It is not a new way, but has the merit of being old and tried. It merely is to have no money issued by the government under, say, \$10, but silver money or silver certificates issued in small denominations as against the silver bullion actually in stock in the treasury vaults. Were that done the majority of our people would seldom see any other than silver money, or its equivalent in paper.

The six hundred millions (\$600,000,000) now in stock which so alarms the money centers, would soon be in such wide circulation that there would be no danger of its being returned to the treasury in demand for gold, or of its proving an embarrassment to the government in any way. On the contrary, by lessening the demand for gold, it would tend to lessen the pressure upon the reserve fund and to render the issuing of bonds unnecessary. Above all, it would maintain the silver coin so issued at its face value, and thereby avoid the calamities of a depreciated currency. Great Britain is denounced as a "gold bug," yet as a matter of fact there is more silver money in circulation throughout her empire than gold, and all because she knows no other kind of money under \$5. Here as there silver can be made essentially the people's money.

WORK FOR HARMONY.

The Republican situation in this county is not improved. The first skirmishes with the enemy have not yet taken place. The strife for nomination always causes strain and dissatisfaction. The ticket, as a whole, is not as strong as it was two years ago. Still it is a strong and creditable ticket, composed of clean and able men, who would vote right for the people and who would vote for the return of Mr. Mitchell. The district campaign committee should have had the courtesy and sagacity to present the Marion county Republican legislative ticket to the audience at Mr. Tongue's meetings.

Republicans who want to elect the district, legislative and county ticket will now lay aside all minor differences and work for the whole ticket. Mr. Tongue at his meetings has not mentioned the legislative ticket, though asked to do so. He could not do so without saying something for the return of John H. Mitchell to the United States senate. Mr. Tongue cannot be expected to dip into the fight for the senatorship. Still, his supporters ought to support the legislative ticket, even if it is for Mitchell.

THE SALEM JOURNAL is doing valiant work for the regular Republican ticket. It favors no man put up by bolting horses.—Heppner Gazette.

TRAIN LOAD OF CATTLE.—John Stewart will ship a trainload of cattle from this city some time between the 1st and middle of June. There are 1,000 head of cattle and they will be shipped to Joseph Roach at Northfield, Minn. They are one, two and three year old steers, and the prices paid for them by Mr. Stewart were \$8, \$13 and \$17 per head. The cattle will probably be used in supplying the northwest Indian reservation.—Eugene Guard.

THE BROOKS MUDDLE.

The Jones faction in Brooks precinct run a local Republican club. That club wanted to name all three judges of the primaries.

The committeeman for that precinct was authorized by the county central committee to name the judges. He named two, selected by the club and one man to represent Mission Bottom.

M. L. Jones wanted to go to the legislature as an anti-Mitchell man. The precinct at the primaries sat down on him. Ever since that event Jones wants to beat the whole Republican ticket in this county—at least the legislative part of it.

The Jones faction have been in the habit of running things in that precinct. They are big taxpayers and farmers, and we print their statement of the case and the statement of Mr. LaFollette.

The people everywhere are tired of autocratic bulldozing methods, and will roll up a bigger vote for the Republican ticket without such methods than with them. They want no Republicanism merely for the few and that with a string to it.

Protection and Bimetallism.

While American woolen and other factories have been closed by the Wilson-Gorman tariff, those of Great Britain have been running night and day manufacturing for the American market. They have immensely increased their output, and the dividends of the Bradford and other woolen mills have been doubled. This spirit has tended to disguise the real condition of affairs, and English journals are gravely discussing the return of prosperous times and deriding the British bimetallic sentiment, which is adroitly kept out of practical politics.

But these journals will have to pipe another tune if a Republican protectionist is chosen president and a congress ready to pass a protective tariff is elected. Nothing could more effectively bring England to her senses than a high protective tariff. It would destroy the prosperity she enjoys at the expense of American workmen and make her cast about for ways and means to open trade with countries where the silver standard prevails.

This would bring her face to face with the evils of a monetary system which practically operates as an excluder of goods manufactured in gold-standard countries from silver-using countries. England has already suffered some of the evil consequences of the system in her relations with Mexico, but she would feel them still more if she was deprived of the profitable privilege of dumping her goods into the United States at prices we cannot compete with so long as we maintain our present scale of wages and high standard of living.

This is a view of the case which will be forced on the attention of the Republican Senators who are so staunchly advocating the cause of free silver. If they find it impossible to educate the country up to their ideas they may justly conclude that the best weapon with which to bring Great Britain, the worst enemy of bimetallicism, to terms is protection.—San Francisco Chronicle.

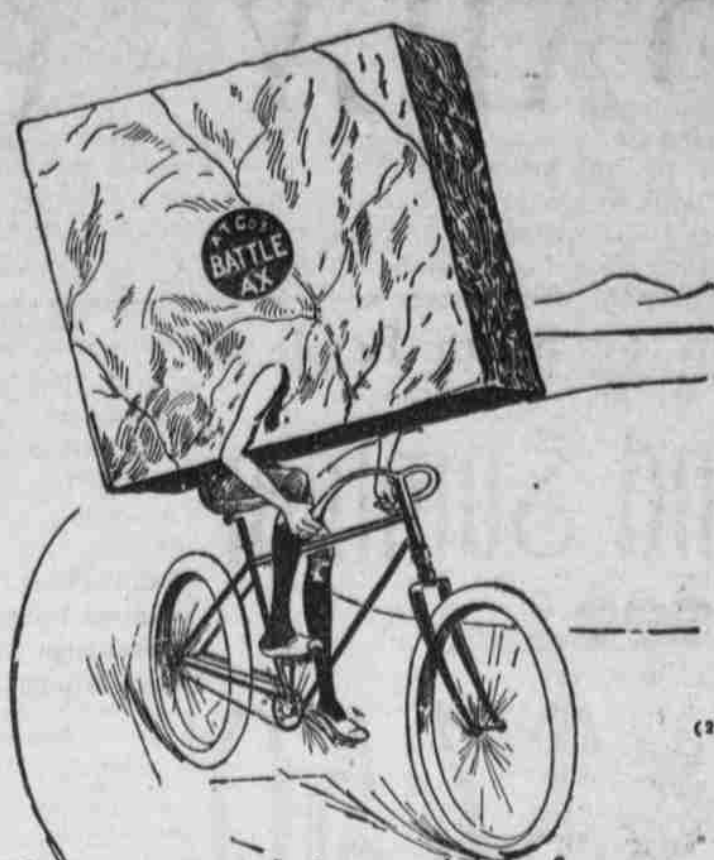
