PRISONERS' RELEASE

Pretoria Reformers Pardoned Except Leaders

GET THE FULL SENTENCE

The Others Are Simply Exiled for Three Years.

LONDON, May 13.—In was reported on stock exchange this afternoon that the Pretoria reform prisoners, with the exception of the five leaders, had been released, subject to three years' banishment. There were 50, each sentenced to two years' imprisonment, with \$10,000 fine, or failing payment one year additional imprisonment, and three years' banishment after the expiration of the imprisonment.

International Exhibition.

KIEL, Germany, May 13.—An international exhibition for navigation and fisheries will be held here from today to September 30, under the auspices of the German government. The exhibition will be a comprehensive display of all matters relating to navigation at sea, including vessels of all descriptions, mechanical appliances belonging to ships of all kinds, sanitary engines, including instruments, models of harbors, wharves, etc., and vessels and apparatus pertaining to the fisheries. Uncle Sam will make a display.

PHILADELPHIA, May 13.—The triennial meeting of the General Society of the Cincinnati will be held here today. Tomorrow morning a delegation will be taken to Valley Forge by a special train. The society was founded in 1783, and at present there are societies in New Jersey, Maryland, South Carolina, Pennsylvania, New York, Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island.

Yacht Meteor.

GOUROCK, Scotland, May 13.—This is one of the dates set for the launching of the German Emperor's new yacht, Meteor. She will be a flier and is expected to hold her own against the Valkyrie, Ailsa and Britannia. Her sale place will employ between 11,000 and 12,000 square feet of canvas, about as much as the American Defenders.

School of Design.

NEW YORK, May 13.—The annual election of the Academy of Council, Jury of selection and Hanging Committee of the National Academy of Design will take place this evening. The question of choosing a site for the future home of the Academy of Design will figure in the choice.

Road Convention.

CONCORD, N. H., May 13.—The state board of agriculture has called for a good roads convention to meet in this city today and tomorrow. There will be a practical discussion of road building, with addresses by eminent specialists and others, with work by all kinds of machines both days.

Convention Adjourned.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., May 13.—At 4:30 this morning the Republican state convention adjourned, after resolving in favor of McKinley for president and sound money.

BUFFALO, May 13.—The American Ticket Brokers' Association, will hold its convention in this city, beginning today. Mayor Jewett will open the convention.

John Hare Returns.

NEW YORK, May 13.—John Hare, the English comedian, who has just closed his first American tour, will sail today, but will return next season to make another tour.

Important Decision.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 13.—The supreme court has rendered a decision holding the barbershop Sunday law as unconstitutional, as class legislation, operating against the receipts of the owner, which are construed as property.

The court also holds that drug stores and other places operating soda fountains, etc., cannot be compelled to sell to colored persons or any one else if they do not desire to do so.

Methodist Conference.

CLEVELAND, May 13.—The Methodist conference today, by a vote of 387 to 19 changed the time of the meeting of the next conference from May 1st to the second Wednesday in May, 1900. Resolutions denouncing the Armenian outrages were also passed.

Oklahoma Judge.

WASHINGTON, May 13.—The president today sent to the senate the nomination of John C. Tarsney, of Missouri, as associate justice of the supreme court of Oklahoma. Mr. Tarsney is a well known ex-congressman of Kansas City. He held a seat in the present congress, but was unseated.

California Pops.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., May 13.—The first business at the Populist convention this morning was the report of the committee on order of business. Strong objection was made to the endorsement of anyone for United States senator. Gibson, of Alameda, favored endorsing Cator.

Contracts Not Limited.

WASHINGTON, May 13.—The senate has defeated by 40 to 23, the amendment of German to the river and harbor bill, limiting expenditures under contract to ten millions annually.

The Fruit Crop.

Commissioner Charles L. Daley, of the second horticultural district, finds the prospects of the prune crop no more encouraging than given a week ago. The status of the prune crop to date as given by Mr. Daley is as follows:

"Italian prunes—Total failure with exception possibly of an occasional small spot where trees are specially favored."

"Petites will yield about one-fourth crop."

"There will be from one-fourth to three-fourths crop of silver prunes from present indications."

The petites are now about the size of a flax seed and the silver variety as large as a grain of wheat. Mr. Daley fears that from now on, that many of the young prunes will drop from the stem under the rays of the sun. He does not attribute the apparent shortage to frost, but wholly to the continued cold rains that have prevented pollination.

The prospect for other fruits the commissioner finds varies to extremes in different sections of the district, and the output is estimated at a failure in some instances to full crop in others. Mr. Daley is of the opinion that a good price will be realized on all Oregon green fruits this year.

THE POLITICAL SITUATION.

EDITOR JOURNAL:—Every Republican is desirous that the Republican ticket should be successful in the coming election, all would like to make a clean sweep.

As Republicans we all believe the "Wilson Tariff" is the cause of all the hard times. We do not believe that demonization of silver (so called) had anything to do with hard times. We believe that wheat, oats, potatoes, hops, etc., are cheap because there has been more raised than was needed for consumption, and on account of the "Wilson bill" destroying our home market. We believe that eggs are cheap at the present time because the hens are laying more than can be eaten, and on account of the "Wilson Bill" which opens our egg market to Canada and Europe. We believe that there has been no contraction in currency, only as was caused by the operation of the Wilson bill by turning the working people out of employment and thereby closing the only avenue through which money circulates.

Believing the above to be the foundation of Republicanism we wish to do nothing to endanger the enactment of a protective Tariff law. We do not object to a man believing in free coinage of silver 16 to 1, providing our senators and congressmen would be manly enough to try to enact their views into a law standing upon its own merit.

But we do object to their action in the present congress. It showed the Republican silver senator and congressman to be cranks, one idea men. Knowing that there was no possible chance of free coinage of silver becoming a law, still they obstructed a Republican measure, included the "Tariff bill" by a free silver amendment and they have since declared that they would adopt the same policy in the future.

The question is, is it the duty of Republicans to support men at this coming election, who will vote for a senator who thinks all our hard times is caused by a law passed 23 years ago, notwithstanding we have had 20 years of the greatest prosperity this nation has ever known since that law was passed and believing this to be a fact they stand ready to attack a silver amendment to every Republican measure, including all tariff laws? We are well aware that John H. Mitchell, senator, did not vote for the silver amendment on the tariff bill in the present session of congress, although he did vote for the silver amendments on other Republican bills, and also we remember that he was the only Republican free silver senator who was to come before the people for re-election. All the rest bound themselves to obstruct every law by amendments, until the senate passed a free silver bill. Everyone knows that if Hon. J. H. Mitchell had joined these five worthies, that all hopes of re-election would have vanished; but no one knows how he would have voted if he had several years more to serve, for Senator Mitchell is just as radical on this question, as any of the other five Republican senators, who have declared free silver 16 to 1, or no Republican legislation.

We are not fighting free coinage of silver, but we are fighting for a Republican protection tariff law, and the free coinage silver men 16 to 1, in the coming senate can defeat all Republican measures in the same way that they did in the present session, and in fulfillment of their declared purpose in the future.

We stand upon the state Republican platform; making no fight against a candidate because he believes in free silver. But as Republicans, we fight them because they want to defeat every Republican measure in the next congress, and because they have power to do it.

A binding obligation is necessary from our candidates for representation, promising that they will vote for no United States senator who will not pledge himself to vote against every amendment calculated to defeat a Republican protective tariff bill or any other Republican measure. We believe that this is in accordance with the feeling of every candidate. But the Republican danger here are the free silver Republican senators elected, and to be elected, and as Republicans, it is our duty to reduce that danger as much as possible.

EDITORIAL COMMENT.

[The above evasive, dodging excuse of a goldbug Republican for bolting the Republican legislative ticket in this county is so thin and misty that it is laughable. It is idiotic to ask candidates for the legislature to pledge themselves to vote for no man for United States senator who will not in advance pledge himself to pursue a certain course. Such men want a man to be a mere figurehead, a slave, a dummy to their opinions, whether in the legislature or congress. We print the above effusion to show the means resorted to for the purpose of defeating Senator Mitchell, a man who has sought to fairly, faithfully and fearlessly represent the people of Oregon.]

John H. Mitchell is the ablest and foremost champion of a protective tariff from the Pacific coast. He has always stood ready to vote for a Republican tariff measure and parted company with the free silver senators who put silver before protection. John H. Mitchell voted for a silver bill as a separate measure, and for a silver amendment to the house gold bond bill. He was elected in 1890 on a Republican free coinage of both gold and silver platform, and he has adhered to that platform which Mr. Dolph boasted he had the temerity to disregard and which he spit upon.

The thing for all men who call themselves Republicans is to vote for the entire legislative ticket in Marion county and in any county where the candidates stand upon the broad platform of protection and bimetalism. That is just what the so-called "sound money" Republicans will not do. They worship the one idea of goldbugism. While they are afraid to come out openly and say so they are trying to invent excuses for bolting and secretly knifing Republican nominees who stand on the Republican platform of 1892 and 1894 and 1896 in Oregon. THE JOURNAL has only contempt for the assumed dictatorship and patronizing attitude of the goldites towards the Republican party. It has never declared for the single gold standard and we trust it never will. Not one of these goldite howlers but would be willing by any evasion or trickery to cheat the people into adopting a finance system they dare not advocate openly. No single gold standard man dare go before the people of Oregon as such, yet they want to run the party and rule the people in a secret and underhanded manner. Let these men come out openly and say where they stand and that they don't believe in a government of the people. Three-fourths of the people want bimetalism and these autocrats have the cheek to want to dictate to legislators and senators in the interest of the gold monopolist.

These goldite dictators have been willing the Republican party should go before the people on a silver platform and then demand the election of a man like Dolph, who spits upon bimetalism. Is this honest? Is it sincere? For shame! Is there a worse "one-idea" man than the single gold standard man? If there is we have not found him. Be he Republican or Democrat he lays down all other principles and worships the golden calf as the panacea for all the ills the people suffer under.
