There is a bas-relief of Stevenson, by St. Gaudens and a number of excellent pictures, with a highly appreciative sketch of the gentle and much beloved poet-author.

THE ONLY REPUBLICAN.

There is only one Republican daily and weekly newspaper—the Statesman.

The above this morning will be startling news. What an awful responsibility!
