ON DECORATION DAY

Salem Presented a Lively Appearance.

THOUSANDS OF VISITORS

An Enjoyable Evening at the Opera House.

Saturday was a beautiful day and Salem people turned out en masse to honor the nation's dead. The heavens were covered with light fleecy clouds that seemed to absorb the sun's heat while a refreshing breeze from the south west acted as a substitute for a fan. It was indeed a pleasant afternoon to be out and Salemites made the best of the opportunity.

Friday evening and early Saturday morning people were to be seen winding their way to the different cemeteries, heavily laden with flowers and other emblems, symbolic of their honor and reverence for departed loved ones. Although but few roses were used in decorating the graves, the cemetery presented a most beautiful sight Friday evening. Some of the decorations gave evidence of much work and were quite tastefully arranged on the graves.

The street cars were taxed to their utmost capacity in transporting the immense throng to and from the cemetery. However, the crowd was handled without the least accident whatever, which seems remarkable when such a crowd is about.

The procession was well carried out by Chief Marshal D. C. Sherman and F. A. Leeg, Geo. H. Burnett, W. H. Downing, and Chas. Robbin. The march began about 1:45 p. m. and the column was formed as follows:

Chief Marshal and Aids, Second Regimental Band Companies' band, I Battalion, Second Regiment, Gov. Lord and Staff, Indian War Veterans, Sedgwick Post, G. A. R.

Sedgwick Relief Corps, Woodmen of the World, Chemawa Training school band, Chemawa Training school cadets, citizens in carriages.

Arrived at the cemetery, all assembled at the G. A. R. lot, where impressive services were conducted by Sedgwick Post No. 10, G. A. R., Commander J. Q. Barnes acting as master of ceremonies. Mr. Barnes spoke of the impressiveness of the occasion, and privilege and duty of doing honor to the nation's dead. Selections from the Second Regiment band were interspersed throughout the exercises.

The Chemawa Training school band also played a selection. Although this band has only recently been organized, they made a fine appearance and played remarkably well. Company I, gave the usual salute over the graves of the unknown dead. Ralph Matthews, son of D. W. Matthews, gave an appropriate recitation, and the exercises were concluded with a benediction by Rev. J. P. Farmer of the First Baptist church.

The members of the G. A. R. and their families repaired to their hall in the State Insurance building, and partook of refreshments that had been prepared by the Woman's Relief Corps.

NOTES.

Salem Camp No. 118, Woodmen of the World, was the only fraternal society that was represented in the procession. It was out about 100 strong.

The Chemawa Indian boys' band, numbering seventeen pieces, made a very favorable impression. The boys played very well for a musical company of so recent an organization.

The Indian school cadets, numbering sixty, made a good appearance. Their behavior and marching was all that could be asked.

AT REED'S OPERA HOUSE.

At 8 o'clock Saturday evening, with the exception of those seats that had been reserved for the G. A. R. and W. R. C., every seat both in the large auditorium and gallery was taken. Standing room was at a premium and hundreds were turned away, being unable to obtain admission owing to the immense throng. When commander J. Q. Barnes stepped up on the platform shortly after 8 o'clock he was greeted with a perfect sea of faces.

Much credit is due the decorating committee, consisting of E. K. Hall, H. I. Brown, A. W. Doaner, Ed Briggs, Dr. T. C. Smith, Mrs. A. Dickey, Mrs. Frank Davey and Miss Ida Bennett, for their good work. Red white and blue bunting had been artistically adjusted about the opera house. To the rear of the stage was a beautiful silk flag which formed a most appropriate and lovely background. At a point in the center of the woodwork enclosing the stage, was placed a portrait of Washington, while on either side of him were also portraits of Lincoln and Grant.

The evening exercises were opened with a very impressive prayer by Rev. J. P. Farmer, after which the glee club under the direction of Prof. Heritage, sang an appropriate selection, "One flag, one country still" for which they were warmly applauded. The glee club consisted of Mrs. F. G. Davis, Misses Mina Heulat, Lona White and Rose Woodruff; Messrs J. R. Davis, H. G. Kundret, J. O. Borth and Prof. R. A. Heritage; Prof. Winkler accompanied on the piano. The evening's program was interspersed with music from this popular company. The flag drill by sixteen little girls, from the East Salem school, under direction of Miss R. F. Smith, was especially worthy of mention. The patriotic little citizens were accorded a deafening applause.

Little Irma Hall, the four-year-old daughter of Prof. Hall, of Lincoln school, recited "You Put no Flowers on my Papa's Grave", remarkably well. Miss Adda Pugh recited "Whispering Bill" and received a generous applause.

The solo and chorus, "Tenting Tonight", by Prof. Heritage and the glee club took the house by storm. He kindly responded to the encore by singing that song that thrills the old soldiers every time it is repeated.

"Marching Through Georgia", the audience joining on the chorus, and a chorus it was too. Responding to a second encore Prof. Heritage gave a negro selection, the glee club joining on the chorus. It was a beautiful piece.

Addresses were made by Captain S. B. Ormsby, Gov. W. P. Lord and Lieut. Col. Jas. Jackson, U. S. A., of Vancouver. Thus another Decoration day was closed and Salemites retired with a warmer spot in their hearts than they ever had before, for the boys in blue.
