INTEREST SQUABBLE

Between Marion County and the State

CONSTRUCTIVE CHARGES

County Treasurer Minto Will Resist Payment

There is a controversy between the county treasury of Marion county and the state treasury over constructive interest charges.

THE AMOUNT INVOLVED IS SMALL—a difference of \$208.51,—but the principle contended for involves charges of thousands of dollars against the taxpayers of the whole state.

THE PEOPLE OF OREGON very well understand that Oregon public treasurers have been conducted largely in the interest of speculators and money-lenders, and the public funds have not been applied as they should be to wiping out interest bearing warrants.
