We shall good naturedly as possible go on showing up jobs and robberies on the people, and shall not support corrupt men or men who abandon principles to get office even though they be in our party. We shall help the people and the taxpayers under all circumstances as against the politicians, and advocate the true interests of the people. The abuse will keep on but it cannot harm the right or true principles that are not in the keeping of any man or set of men. The anonymous assailant has usually good reasons for hiding behind a nom-de-plume. He is ashamed of assailing another, or he is afraid to show his head or expose himself to a reply. The guerrilla in warfare is never heroic.

THE NOMINATING SPEECHES.

THE JOURNAL in common with other associated press papers has been supplied by the enterprise of Manager Stone with advance copies of the nominating speeches in the Chicago national convention. There are so many of them and they are such uniform laudations of one politician by another that we had two of them set up in advance of delivery, and through misapprehension they were run into the report.
