**THE ISSUE.**  
The money question is the vital issue in this campaign. It has been made so by the money power on the one hand and by the stringency of the times on the other. Under the Cleveland administration the allied money interests of the country found an opportunity to dictate terms to the government, forced it to stop coining of silver, to discredit its own currency and to issue bonds in time of peace to defray current expenses and maintain its credit.

The bankers have dictated terms to the administration, handled its loans with gold from its own treasury or its own funds, and have today under the gold standard virtually got the United States treasury at their mercy. And what are the tender mercies of Heidelberg, Telleheimer & Co. toward Uncle Sam? They are drawing the gold out of the treasury day by day, and the only escape they say is to withdraw the backs and paper money from circulation, or you must go on borrowing ad infinitum.

We have demonetized silver; now we demand the withdrawal of the credit money of the United States or we shall use it to draw all the gold out of the treasury. That is their ultimatum. The national bankers cry Amen to this, knowing that the people cannot do business without a large volume of paper money, and declare we are the only boys who can supply this money and keep it good as gold on bond basis. That is the issue in this campaign. It is the only issue. The money power has made it the issue. Heidelberg, Heidelberg & Co. have allied with the national association of bankers to force the money issue in this campaign. They have said they will know no party.

First they said, let us get control of the Republican party and platform. The Democratic party will divide and the people will be scattered like a flock of sheep without a master and we will bite the nation by the grace of God and gold bonds. Foreign capital will flow in and railroad stocks will boom. Immigration will flow in, the factories will run and the millennium will reign financially.

combination that has essayed to run the country. With corrupt primaries in the big cities and corrupt men in charge of the party machinery and unlimited railroad passes a political party becomes an easy prey to the combination.

What will the people do? The government cannot get revenues, the industries cannot flourish without a reasonable degree of protection. Will the people accept McKinley on a gold standard? They will if nothing better offers. If a good candidate is put up who represents protection and bimetallicism, look out.

**FOREIGN IMMIGRATION.**  
"For the protection of the quality of our American citizenship and the wages of our workmen against the fatal competition of low-priced labor, we demand that the immigration laws be thoroughly enforced and so extended as to exclude from entrance to the United States those who can neither read nor write."

The above is the national Republican platform on the question of foreign immigration. The failure of congress just adjourned, to pass the Stone bill to prohibit dangerous and pauper classes of foreign immigration should have drawn from the convention, a more specific declaration on this subject.

To merely prohibit the immigrant who cannot read or write, is neither adequate nor just. He may read or write his own language. Every Italian, Chinaman or Jap can do that. The question should have met with a broader and fuller treatment at the hands of the convention. The fact that nearly one-third of the population of the United States came from Europe, should have warned the convention to treat the subject more intelligently.

No total exclusion of foreign immigration is possible in this day and age of civilization. Mechanics, artists, professional men, those with capital enough to begin an industry or buy a farm, persons who intend to settle here with their families, and become self-supporting factors of the community and American citizens, cannot be excluded without hindering the development of the country. The above plank is a partial recognition of the importance of the subject, but it is not a remedy that is adequate or founded on any sound principle of protection to our country against dangerous and pauperized elements, that can never become desirable American citizens.

**VERY UNJUST.**  
Oregon Republicans are represented on the national committee by a New York man, instead of Joe Simon, who gave the New Yorker his proxy. Pity he could not find an honest Republican in Oregon to perform the duties. As usual, bounden to the Eastern money ring—Woodburn Independent.

This is very unjust, Mr. Simon sent his proxy to Oscar Mayer, a brother-in-law of Hon. Solomon Hirsch, chairman of the State Republican committee of Oregon—Oregonian.

If Joe Simon could have entrusted his proxy to an honest Republican at St. Louis, it would have been more courteous to the people of this state. Mr. Mayer, of New York, could not represent the Republicans of Oregon, but probably represented them fully as well as the eight delegates who put Oregon in the gold standard column.

A Call for a Convention in Marion County, June 26.

McMINNVILLE, June 20.—(Special to THE JOURNAL).—The following letter is an answer to one received from Mr. Milner, stating that "the Multnomah Bimetallic League contemplates calling a mass convention to elect delegates to the state convention at McMinnville," and asking to know the purposes and intentions of the convention. DEAR SIR.—Replying to yours of yesterday, I enclose a copy of the call for state convention. The object is as stated by you—"to unite the silver forces for the presidential campaign, and to elect delegates to the St. Louis silver convention."

We understand Col. Drake, under the authority of the American Silver Organization, has named delegates to the convention. We are advised that some of those named cannot attend I presume that it will be the policy of the convention to confirm his selections, where those selected can attend and elect others in place of those who cannot. In any event it will strengthen the delegates from our state by leaving them to say that the state is with them.

We have letters, encouraging us in this work, from such men as Sibley, Teller, Bland and others. Conventions are called in a number of counties in the state, and we hope for a full expression from all, so we can have an understanding as to how we shall unite all the silver men.

Further, we presume all the work necessary for a complete party organization will have to be done at this convention, and then fully armed, we will be ready for the fray.
