

## WHITNEY FOR PRESIDENT.

The Democratic leaders have awakened at a late hour to the necessity of preventing their party organization being swept away by the rising flood of silver sentiment which is sweeping over the United States. President Cleveland has written a letter on the importance of the sound money Democrats being in evidence from this time forward until the meeting of the Chicago convention. They have performed in the past as when Cleveland and Whitney whipped the whole party into line four years ago for a moderate tariff and a guarded financial plank. In these hard times when Democrats who are out of office can not raise the money to attend a national convention, delegates and alternates will be picked up in every state of the Union who can be influenced after they get to Chicago in favor of the gold standard.

We should not be surprised to see the Democratic convention adopt a gold standard platform and a gold candidate, or a straddle or an equivocation on one or the other, which would be just as offensive to the rack and file. Whitney is a master hand at organizing the rich and purchasable elements of the party. He has been carte blanche by the president and the capitalists to corral the wild and woolly silverites of the south and west. As an arch-plutocrat and arch-corruptionist he will lead the revolt dictated by Cleveland against popular sentiment within the party for silver and ram a gold program down the throats of the delegates. Three-fourths of them are now instructed for free silver, but ways and means will be found to evade their instructions and again force the party of Jefferson and Jackson to become the bond servant of the corporations and the millionaires.

Nothing could be more fortunate for the silver cause at this time than the imperial crusade of Cleveland-Whitney et al. against it. The office-holding class in the Democratic party will be whipped into line to do the bidding of the money power and the silver vote will be whipped out of the Democratic party. Selfishness can be relied upon to overreach and make fatal blunders at the right time always to defeat itself, and just as the slave power prostituted political organizations in its day, organized capital is rending the old political parties of today.

## SILVER LABOR.

SALEM, June 22, '96.

EDITOR JOURNAL.—The following is from the editorial page of Sunday's Statesman:

"Reader, how much wages do you get, if you work, or how much will you get if you can get a job at what you are able to do, or if you are compelled to work at some time in the future? Is it \$2 a day? That was a fair average before the crime of 1892. Then the free silver men, if they succeed, will cut your wages in two. You will then get the equivalent of a dollar a day, or if you are receiving a dollar now, you will then be paid the equivalent of 50 cents. You will receive the same number of dollars, but they will be worth just half as much as now in purchasing anything you want to buy, with the one exception of labor. No free silver man who is intelligent will deny this. Ask one of them whom you can trust, and who understands the subject, and see if this is not his testimony. Then the free traders would have you compete on equal terms with the laborers of China, Japan and India, receiving 10 cents a day, living on rice and going naked. And yet we hear laboring men on the streets of Salem, intelligent appearing men, too, every day, talking in favor of populism and general calamity, consorting and working with those who would have both free trade and free silver. Does this not seem strange?"

The above is the standing argument of the gold standard press. They repeat it over and over, hoping to frighten the wage earners into voting the bankers and monopolists' tickets. It is a weak argument but one of their best, and on so good a foundation do they build their hopes of success in the present campaign.

Notice the admission made that the price of all commodities will double. How do you like that farmers? and you blacksmiths, wagon makers, contractors? How dollar wheat for the farmers and 100 per cent advance in the value of the product of the mechanics make your margin of profits less? Grocers, commission men, dry goods men, hardware men, manufacturers, when do you sell your goods at the best margin of profit?

Is it not when high prices are paid the farmers, and those who are converting the raw products gathered from the four corners of the earth into the finished articles of commerce?

Reader, how much wages do you get under the present gold standard? Remember the Republican party in their national platform declare: "The present gold standard must be preserved."

If you are at work you are getting but very little higher wages than the laborer of gold standard Europe, and you will not get one cent more within five years from now. When under this unpatriotic, servile policy, the farmers have been forced to give up their farms, which are now under mortgage and thousands of them have taken their places in the great army of common laborers.

We plead guilty to the charge of standing on the street talking free silver and we do not need the hired organs of the banks and official class to tell us how to vote.

We know dollar wheat will mean thousands of happy homes, thousands of us who have been forced into the ranks of the wage earners will go back again to mother earth to build homes for which we would lay down our lives, if need be, to protect.

The skilled mechanic would also leave the ranks of the common laborers and open shops of their own. High prices mean high profits and our mechanics would become home-builders upon which depends the perpetuation of this government. Now for common laborers: show us one of this class who does not expect something to own a small farm or some business of his own. Is there any hope for that in gold standard for Europe or America? Does any sane man believe that with high prices, which the Statesman admits we will have, under free coinage.

When the producer, the manufacturer and the trader are making money that the common laborer would not get good wages? There would be such a demand for labor that the wages would advance in proportion to other things. It is a positive truth that the producers represent the very foundation of civilization and society. When they prosper all other classes flourish. When they are forced by unjust laws to toil for nothing, every class which draws its subsistence from them suffers except the gold farmer, whose crop is money. We know why we want free coinage of silver and we will talk it, pray for it, work for it, and we will get it.

When we have done so we will make two blades of grass grow where but one grew before. We will fill this United States of America with the brightest, happiest race of people on earth. We will make it a nation of home-builders, not a nation of tenants.

Shame on the individual, paper or party who would sacrifice the happiness and liberty of the great common people for a few paltry dollars and the praise of those who do the bidding of the great money changer of the world, who know no people, no country, no patriotism.

What becomes of the man who has been saying that we had bimetalism and that he was a genuine bimetalist because he opposed free coinage of both metals? The Republican platform says the present system is the single gold standard and must be maintained. How do you like it? How have you prospered under it?

If McKinley is elected the house is liable to be against him on both the tariff and silver. The senate will be against him on silver. No tariff bill can pass under his administration without recognition of silver. Look out for two years of unrest and uncertainty unless both the money and tariff questions are settled by the election of some man like Teller.
