THE SOUND MONEY RALLY.

The Republican rally Saturday night was not intended for an occasion of profound political argument. But enough was said to show that the speakers abandoned the tariff as a paramount issue, and now intend to wage the campaign on the single gold standard program. No new arguments were introduced. Governor Lord admitted the necessity of more currency, but could not see how we could have any silver otherwise than on a gold basis of redemption, or the Sherman plan of maintaining a parity. Judge Lord knows that Mr. Sherman himself has abandoned silver coinage on that plan, and all the silver and paper money issued on that plan is credit money that the government must hold itself ready to redeem in gold and such credit money consequently will be constantly employed to draw the gold out of the treasury with, as it is being done at present. Under free coinage of gold and silver on equal terms at the mint, and at law the government would not have to redeem silver and silver certificates in gold. It would be primary money on equal terms. The government would have to borrow no gold to buy either bullion but would make a handsome profit out of the coinage. What the country needs first, is more primary metallic money. Our currency system of \$1, 600,000,000, is on too small a basis with \$100,000,000 of gold as a basis of redemption and allowing the money changers to employ the silver and paper to draw the gold out of the national treasury, and then loan it back through syndicates for gold bonds at a high rate of interest. Governor Lord knows this, but he deems it inexpedient to admit it because the Republican party has been incompletely substituted to the gold oligarchy, as has the Democratic party under Cleveland. In fact, there is not a hair's breadth of difference between goldbug Republicanism and goldbug Democracy.

Mr. Geer has never ascended above addressing himself to political questions entirely for partisan purposes. He tendered the free and unlimited services of his abilities on this occasion and if he had an original or independent thought on the political outlook he carefully suppressed it and ventured no opinions on the money question. Mr. Moore was put forward to expound the Gresham law but soon dropped it to abuse a few individuals. He is undoubtedly the sound money Moses of Marion county. Another speaker was frank enough to admit that the country is in possession of a gold trust in order to be able to charge that there is also a silver trust and to be able to say that we were in danger of being flooded with 50 cent dollars. Indeed, the 50 cent dollar seemed to be the burden of all their

song. "Until the goldites can advance to the dignity of an argument it may be as well to allow them this precious privilege of malversation. They know that the silver dollar and all our silver coins now circulate at 100 cents on the dollar, whatever that may mean, without any law to redeem them in gold. They know that the law is wrongly construed to mean that our silver notes are redeemable in gold and that they are discredited by the government and the bankers and that everything possible is done to destroy their parity on pretense of maintaining it; yet they circulate at a par with gold and will so long as they possess common legal tender functions in the mind of the common people, and that in spite of the bankers' conspiracy to degrade them to mere token money or credit money. The old coinage law must be restored in its true meaning so that this double pressure be taken off gold and its artificial appreciation stopped by the free coinage of silver on equal terms with gold at the mints of our country. The sound money rally was a failure in the sense that anyone was converted by facts or arguments to accept the single gold standard theory of finance. The gold theory got no applause.

WHAT IS BIMETALLISM?

The Salem organ of gold Republicanism undertakes to explain the meaning of bimetalism as follows: "Bi means two. Bimetallists want to use two metals, gold and silver, as money. Free silver coinage would drive one metal, gold, out of circulation as money. Any intelligent advocate of free coinage will say this is so. The only party, therefore, advocating bimetalism is the Republican party. That party pledges itself to legislation that will keep both metals in circulation as money, with ultimate free coinage of both."

Taking such advantage of its readers will not do. The people have progressed far beyond the politicians and the office-seekers on this money question. But there are those who do not know what bimetalism is. They are told by the gold organs that it means debased currency, dishonest money, repudiation, silver only for money, contraction of the currency, ruin. Let us read the above carefully. Bimetalism means the use of two metals, gold and silver, as the primary money of the country, instead of one metal, gold alone as primary money. Now listen to the juggling of words: "Free silver coinage would drive one metal out of circulation!" The term "free coinage" is twisted to mean free coinage of silver only! Yet there is not a bimetalist in the world but advocates the coinage of both gold and silver as money and the use of both to the fullest extent on equal terms. There is not a Populist debating society in Marion county but has more intelligence than the editor of the Statesman on this subject. The Populists are denounced as flat money men yet there is not one of them but advocates free coinage of gold and silver and is a better sound money man than the editor of the Statesman, who advocates bimetalism on a gold basis—the use of silver as token money kept in circulation with borrowed English gold. That is how he says the Republican party would "keep both metals in circulation as money."

Do we want bimetalism on a gold basis? Do we want to keep up this artificial appreciation of gold that has wrought an era of falling prices such as the world never saw before? Or do we want genuine bimetalism, where the silver dollar will stand on equal

terms with gold, as a dollar of might and power under the flag of our country and the stamp of the American eagle? Shall we maintain the gold monometallism of Great Britain that is crushing the creditor, ruining the business man and driving the laborer to beggary? Or shall we return to the bimetalism of the constitution and honest money that will not appreciate or depreciate?

The editor of the Statesman has enough intelligence to see the fraud he practices by twisting words as he does above. Free coinage of silver does not mean silver monometallism. It means that access for coinage shall be as free, and on the same legal terms for silver as for gold. The bimetalism of the Republican platform is the bimetalism of the Cleveland administration or gold monometallism, or the limited use of silver on a gold bond basis. For shame on such methods of misrepresentation! But it shows to what desperate straits the advocates of the single gold standard are driven. The people have forced them to admit that money is the paramount question. Then they seek to dodge the issue by such subterfuge!

But the Statesman adds insult to injury by its closing words, indicating that the St. Louis platform means, "with ultimate free coinage of both." First the free coinage of silver is cried down as the most dangerous heresy ever invented, absolutely destructive of credit and ruinous to business; we are told it will drive gold out of the country, cut in two the wages of labor and the price of farm products. Then we are assured that the Republican platform means (what it does not mean), "ultimate free coinage of silver!" This shows that the goldites have no argument to go before the people with and so rely upon a campaign of deception and subterfuge. All that is necessary to defeat them at the polls this fall is to tell the people plainly what bimetalism really is—the remonetization of silver to its place as money where it stood in 1873—the use of two metals in place of one—the full use of two dollars where we now have one—a policy of restoration instead of the present policy of contraction and destruction.
