MAN FOUND DEAD.

On the Railroad Track North of Woodburn.

This morning at 8:30 as Bradley Boyington was on his way to the Canby campmeeting he discovered the dead body of a man beside the railroad track one and one-half miles north of Woodburn.

The remains were brought back to the city and laid out in the office of Recorder Ford. Coroner Clough, of Salem, was telegraphed for and an inquest held.

The remains proved to be those of Phillip Pettenberg, of Portland, a traveling man, formerly in the employ of Lang & Co., contractors and builders. The man was well dressed, had a gold watch, \$150 in money, a valise and some valuable papers on his person. His skull was crushed and left leg cut off at the ankle.

The only supposition is that he fell off or was thrown off of the Shasta limited train which went north between 4 and 5 o'clock. The coroner's verdict will be rendered this evening.
