The New Treasurer-Elect Files a Valid Bond. The bond of Geo. L. Brown, the county treasurer-elect, was taken up by the county court Tuesday, and approved. Mr. Brown having been the successful Populist candidate his bond bears the distinction of being the first document of such a character ever approved by a county commissioners' court in old Marion.

WILL RETURN WEDNESDAY. Meyer Cohen to be Taken Home Tomorrow. Meyer Cohen, the young journalist who ran away from San Jose about ten days ago, just a few days previous to the day upon which he was to be married and who surrendered himself to Deputy Sheriff Wrightman late last Friday night, will probably be taken back to California by the overland Wednesday night. Chief of Police Lloyd, of Oakland, left Monday afternoon for Salem and will arrive here tomorrow morning. The San Francisco Chronicle of June 28, contains the following: "Chief Lloyd is not particularly well pleased with the mission. Cohen was a police reporter for a number of years and was popular among the officers. Their duty therefore in receiving him into custody and placing him on trial is a disagreeable one. Cohen's presence at Salem was rather a surprise to those who have followed the case here. He gave it out in Portland that he was going to Chicago, and while it was known that he was very short of funds it was thought that he had enough money to get through. It was never suspected that he would go down the Willamette valley. His surrender is accounted for by the statement that he was probably without money or means to get any, and that hunger, perhaps, and the hopelessness of flight drove him to give up. Despite all that has happened when he reaches Oakland. He will very probably be offered counsel and an effort will again be made to have the complaint withdrawn. It is doubted, however, that very much can be done, as the prosecution is determined and the evidence very damaging."

THE JURY'S VERDICT. Of Phillip Pleitenberg's Death -- Mrs. Boschay's Death. The jury summoned by Coroner A. M. Clough at Woodburn, to determine the cause of the death of the man found near that city, early Monday morning, submitted the following verdict: "That the man was Phillip Pleitenberg, aged 42 years, and a native of Germany. That he came to his death June 29, 1896, by falling from the train, commonly known as the Portland-San Francisco flyer, at a point two miles north of Woodburn, Marion county, Oregon, on or about 4:35 a. m. June 29, 1896—death being directly caused by concussion of the brain, when striking the ties of the railroad track at said point, above specified. Signed: W. L. Troze, foreman; C. F. Whitman, A. L. Hill, Chas. Mosherberger, C. W. Crosby and F. A. Ford. Notwithstanding notice to the contrary in the infallible morning paper, Coroner A. M. Clough did not hold an inquest this morning, over the remains of Mrs. Boschay, who jumped from the third story of the asylum farm cottage Monday morning, from the effects of which she died. The reason for not holding an inquest over Mrs. Boschay's remains, was that Coroner Clough did not think it necessary as no suspicious circumstances were connected with the accident. Mrs. Boschay's remains will be shipped to her husband, at Jacksonville, for burial.
